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It is a specific form of pre-senile dementia (before 65) or senile (occurring after 65) dementia. The terms pre-senile and senile dementia are catch-all terms used to describe any kind of severe mental impairment in older individuals. Approximately one-half of these persons are victims of Alzheimer's disease and about another quarter have demented blood vessels. The remainder suffer from a variety of other neurological and medical diseases. Diagnosis of the specific type of senile or pre-senile dementia is very important since some types, other than Alzheimer's, can be effectively treated.

Alzheimer's is progressive, irreversible, and at this time, there is no known cause or cure. It is estimated that by 1995 one family in three will have been affected.

Alzheimer's disease is found in both sexes, however, it is more common in women. It also affects all races, and is found in all social, economic and environmental backgrounds. It is not a rare disease. In fact, it is common in persons 60 and older. An estimated 9% of people over 65 have Alzheimer's disease.

Whether Alzheimer's is inherited or not is uncertain. This question is the subject of much research. Alzheimer's patients are often otherwise healthy in the early stages of the disorder. The disease in itself does not seem to cause patients physical pain. As it progresses, however, patients become more vulnerable to a variety of physical problems.

The first symptoms of the disease are often overlooked or attributed to stress, depression or some other temporary disorder. In most cases, one of the first manifestations is memory dysfunction. The patient has trouble remembering the familiar names, places and facts of everyday living. Patients often experience great difficulty in finding the appropriate word in casual conversation and their job performance may begin to suffer.
