Immunization program scheduled during July

A free immunization program for preschool children was announced by the Houston mayor, officials from the City's Health and Human Services Department and District 589 of Rotary International.

The program, called "Project Child Guard," is scheduled for the weekends of July 11-12 and July 18-19. Current plans call for mass immunization efforts in Austin, Colorado, Harris, Waller, Washington and Wharton counties. Between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. on Saturdays and from 1 to 4 p.m. on Sundays, pre-school aged children two months through six years

old will be immunized against the preventable diseases of polio, measles (including rubella), mumps, diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough.

The program will be carried out under the organization, supervision and direction of the recognized health agencies operating in their respective areas, which includes the Columbus Clinic, 514 Washington Street in Columbus for Colorado County.

All that parents will have to do to have their children immunized is come to a dispensing location and sign a form authorizing the inoculations.

Walt Lackey, governor of Rotary

International District 589, explained that the 56 Rotary Clubs in the area would supply manpower at each immunization center for crowd control, information, etc., and would promote the program. He added that involvement and support by corporations and other organizations is also being sought.

Lackey explained that impetus for Rotary's involvement, in addition to the basic need for mass immunization of children in the area, came from the current international youth immunization program of Rotary International called "PolioPlus."

Farm families invited to register for Family Land Heritage Program

Pointing to the importance of recognizing and remembering the pioneer farm and ranch families in Texas, Representative Robert Saunders has invited long-time farming families to

participate in the Texas Department of Agriculture's 1987 Family Land Heritage Program.

Registration for the program, which recognizes families who have had land in agricultural production for 100 years or more, is now open and will extend through July 15.

"To date, 193 properties in District 30 have qualified for the Family Land Heritage Program and this year I hope we will be able to identify many more," Saunders stated. Since the program was established in 1974 as a "Century Farm" or "Century Ranch," additionally, a Family Land Heritage Registry will later be published and distributed to all honorees.

Those who wish to apply may obtain an application from their county judge, county historical commission chairperson, the nearest TDA district office or by writing to: Family Land Heritage Program, Texas Department of Agriculture, P.O. Box 12847, Austin, Texas 78711.

These families are living, productive symbols of our family farm unit. We celebrate their past achievements, and acknowledge the importance that such family farms hold for us in the future," said Saunders.

This year's certified registrants will be honored at a state ceremony to be held in Austin in November 1987. Honorees will receive a certificate with an official sign or marker to place on the gate or home designating their property as a "Century Farm" or "Century Ranch."

Congressman Sweeney to host agriculture conference June 27

Agriculture Congressman Mac Sweeney will host the 1987 Texas Agriculture Conference in El Campo on Saturday, June 27, at the American Legion Post 251, Highway 71 and Armory Road.

"We're pleased that El Campo was chosen as this year's site and look forward to welcoming farmers from across the congressional district," said John Hancock Jr., president of El Campo Rice Milling Co.

The 1985 conference was "well worth my going," said Arnold G. Hlavinka, Matagorda County farmer. "The speakers were high caliber and gave us a lot of useful information."

Due to the success of the 1985 conference on agriculture, Sweeney plans to host a conference every two years.

Other topics for the conference include: the success of the marketing loan program for rice; the current world rice market and the outlook for the 1987 crop; the proposed reform of the Farm Credit System; Farmers Home Administration funding; agricultural diversification in Texas; the revision of FIFRA, the nation's pesticide control law, and the current state of United States agricultural trade.

Hundreds of farmers attended the first conference Sweeney hosted in Victoria in 1985, which featured prominent figures from the United States Department of Agriculture, the Environmental Protection Agency, the Texas Department of Agriculture, the Rice Millers' Association, the Texas Farm Bureau and a keynote address by Rep. Larry Combest, R-Lubbock, prominent member of the House Agriculture Committee.

Mary reportedly started appearing to a group of six young people in Medugorje, Yugoslavia. She has been seen by these young people daily since June 1981. She gives the children messages for the world. Her main message is for peace: first within ourselves and then it will spread throughout the entire world.

The children are all parishioners of St. James Catholic Church. For some unknown reason, the parishioners (which number about 400 families) built a church that is large enough to seat up to 1,600 people. As many as 1,200 pilgrims fill the church daily for the services that last from 3-4 hours each evening.

Mary's appearances have greatly affected the young in Yugoslavia. Confessions are heard daily by the hundreds and this is the real goal of Mary's visits. Whether people believe that she appears or not, Mary's belief is not as important to Mary as the belief in her message of peace and reconciliation with God. Mary wants everyone to become stronger Christians and renew their belief in Christ's salvation.
