Mac Sweeney joins congressional coalition
to change rules regarding select committees

United States Congressman Mac Sweeney has joined a congressional coalition advocating proposed legislation expected to save taxpayers almost \$19 million annually by changing the rules in the House of Representatives regarding select committees.

Congress establishes select committees, such as the House and Senate select committees investigating the Iran-contra affair, to focus attention on specific national problems," Sweeney said. "A select committee functions solely to address a particular matter in a timely manner and disband, but all too often they drag on for years—contributing to the national debt."

Sweeney and 12 other congressmen are sponsoring House Resolution 169, legislation that would allow a select committee six years—three sessions of Congress—to achieve its stated goals by prohibiting the reestablishment of select committees for a fourth session of Congress.

IH-10 planned for improvement
A \$300 million program to improve roadways throughout Texas was approved at the May meeting of the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission. The program includes 325 projects covering more than 1,600 miles of highways, said Raymond Stotzer, engineer-director for the highway department.

About 140 of the projects involve upgrading roadways to current standards, Stotzer said. Other projects include resurfacing, repair work and some safety improvements. The majority of the projects will go to contract during the next 21 months.

In Colorado County, 4.6 miles will be improved on IH 10.

The project on IH 10 will be let for bids in November 1987. The projected cost of this project is \$1,430,000. The project will be from the SH 71 Bypass west of Columbus to 0.6 miles east of Alletton Road and will involve widening concrete pavement and bridges and placing an asphalt overlay on top of the existing roadway.
