Colorado County office Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service

After certification of crops, annual rental payments they would accept to convert their highly erodible cropland to permanent vegetative cover.

The county ASCS office will be closed Friday, July 3 in observance of Independence Day.

Operators of farms found out of compliance after a spot-check could lose all program benefits and be subject to liquidated damages.

If you planted a program crop for harvest but it failed to the extent that it will not be cut for grain or lint, you should file an application for disaster credit with ASCS prior to making any other use of the failed acres. Again, this will preserve the crop history and assure deficiency payments provided you are a program participant.

IMPORTANT: ACR land cannot be grazed from May 1 through September 30. It also cannot be hayed or harvested throughout the calendar year. The minimum size for ACR acreage is 5 acres and must be 66 feet wide, unless the ACR requirements are less than 5 acres, or the designated area is a whole field with official acreage. You are permitted one plot of ACR less than 5 acres.

Producers who have CCC-6 Commodity Certificates in their possession need to look at the expiration date of the certificates. If the certificate has a June 30, 1987 expiration date, you need to sell this certificate to someone buying the certificates before this expiration date. CCC-6 Commodity Certificates become void and of no value after the expiration date.

Any foreign entity purchasing agricultural land in the U.S. is required by law to report the purchase to the local county ASCS office. Failure to do so could result in a fine of up to 25% of the purchase price.

The fifth CRP sign-up will begin July 20 and end July 31, 1987. The Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) encourages, through 10-year contracts with USDA, to stop growing crops on highly erodible cropland and plant it to a protective cover of grass or trees. At the time of application producers must submit bids stating the
