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View's On Dental Health

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To prove the point, a dental exam in Corbetta saw the mothers of almost a thousand children to keep complete records of what their children ate for one complete week. The children's teeth were then examined and the results were matched with the diet diaries. The finds showed that children who liked more between-meal sweet snacks had more cavities than those who ate less. They also found that children who ate more fruit and vegetable snacks had fewer cavities than those who liked candy-coffee cake treats.
