

'Type II' hunting areas becoming a reality

The state's Type II wildlife management areas for public hunting took a major step forward Friday, June 26 with the signing of a contract for the lease of 150,130 acres of land from Temple-Estex Co. and 57,718 acres from Kirby Forest Industries Inc. in East Texas.

Glenn A. Chancellor, group vice president of Temple-Estex, and Ronald L. Paul, president of Kirby Forest Industries, a wholly-owned subsidiary of Louisiana-Pacific Corp., signed the three-year agreement with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD).

TPWD officials agreed to manage these lands as part of the total Type II public hunting acreage, and make them available to persons who purchase a \$35 annual permit.

Permit purchasers will be allowed unlimited access to the lands, including hunting during the 1987-88 open hunting seasons.

Charles Allen, director of the TPWD's wildlife division, said negotiations are continuing with other landowners, with the goal of bringing more than 450,000 acres into the program this year.

Allen also said two department-owned wildlife management areas currently operated as Type I are being considered for use in the Type II program, with some limitations as to species to be hunted.

The Type II system will complement the department's Type I wildlife management areas which offer hunting by special permit (drawing, daily fee and self-registration basis).

Announcements will be made later about when the Type II permits will go on sale at TPWD headquarters in Austin and field offices. Revenue from permit sales will be used to pay the department's administrative costs, with the majority of the income being paid to participating landowners based on utilization data collected after the hunting season.

White-winged dove population down

Surveys indicate populations of mourning doves are remaining fairly stable in Texas, but white-winged doves have declined since last year because of reduced nesting habitat.

Ron George, dove program leader for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, said the whitewing production decline in the lower Rio Grande valley this year can be traced to the 1983 freeze which killed thousands of acres of citrus groves. "Many farmers simply abandoned their citrus groves when the trees were killed in the freeze," said George. "The dead and dying trees provided nesting habitat for about three years, but now they have deteriorated too much to be productive."

George said this means the citrus groves which last year provided about half the available nesting habitat now amount to only about a fourth. During 1986, about 159,000 whitewings were banded in Texas, but only 107,000 are using them this year, he said. The decline in citrus places additional pressure on the diminishing amount of native brush nesting sites in the valley. "This points up the extreme importance of the department's habitat acquisition program, funded by sales of state white-winged dove stamps," George said. The \$5 stamps are required in addition to a hunting license to take whitewings anywhere in the state.

The estimated 421,000 white-winged doves nesting in Hidalgo, Starr, Willacy and Cameron Counties represent an 11 percent decline from last year, and 14 percent below the long-term average.

While whitewing populations are down, George said numbers are sufficient for the traditional four-day special whitewing season recommended for September 5-6 and 12-13. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission will add dove seasons for 1987-88 in a public hearing in Austin July 23.

The mourning dove situation is somewhat rosy, George said, with surveys in Texas and states to the north indicating populations roughly equal to 1986 levels. "Call-count surveys indicated an eight percent decrease in the Texas breeding population from a year ago, but the statewide population appears to be equal to or slightly above the 15-year average," George said. Surveys conducted by other states in the central management unit also indicate mourning dove populations are remaining fairly stable, which means Texas hunters can expect about the same number of migrant birds as last hunting season, George said.

Hallettsville men injured in wreck

On Sunday, June 28 at 1:25 a.m., Trooper Sanchez was called to an accident on U.S. 90, 1.8 miles east of Columbus. Trooper Jim Billings of Eagle Lake and the Colorado County Sheriff's Office assisted Sanchez.

According to the police report, Richard Garcia of Alton was traveling east on U.S. 90 after leaving Poor Boys Bar, when he crossed into the westbound lane and collided head on with a 1983 Ford F-150 pickup, driven by Dennis Kocian Jr., 20, of Hallettsville. Passengers in Kocian's car were William and Mary Nix, age 21 and 19 respectively, of Hallettsville. Kocian braked to try to avoid the collision, but was unsuccessful.

Kocian and the two other young men were transported to the Columbus Community Hospital by Colorado County Volunteer Emergency Ambulance Corps. Kocian had injuries to his face and the other two received injuries to a left leg and to a left shoulder. All front seat passengers of the pickup were wearing their seat belts.

Garcia had minor lacerations to his head from striking the windshield, but he refused medical treatment at the scene. He was not wearing his seat belt. Trooper Sanchez charged Garcia with driving while intoxicated, with a blood alcohol level of .15, and with a serious bodily injury, being on the wrong side of the road not passing and no liability insurance.

Quail, turkey apparently unhurt by recent flooding

Wildlife biologists of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department said record rainfall and flooding during May and June probably had no major effect on quail and turkey nesting, and prospects remain excellent for the fall hunting seasons.

Record-setting rainfall during the month caused streams to overflow in much of the traditional quail and turkey range in West, Central and South Texas. Wildlife officials feared that newly-hatched quail and turkeys were lost to drowning, exposure or starvation.

However, observations in the field indicate turkey populations will be above average and the possibility exists for an excellent production year for quail.

"Range conditions are unbelievable for this time of year," said biologist Randy Fugate of Falfurrias, whose area of eastern South Texas is acclaimed by experts as being some of the nation's best quail habitat. "There may have been some minor losses in isolated areas, but it looks like we are in for a real explosion of quail this year."

Fugate said he has seen large numbers of turkey poults and quail chicks. "We have seen young quail of varying sizes, so it appears that they had several peaks in hatching this year."

Larry Holland of Brownwood, whose region covers a large portion of west-central Texas, likewise feels the heavy rains failed to hurt ground-nesting birds. "I never predict a bumper year for quail, because anything can happen through the rest of the summer," Holland said, "but if we ever are going to have a bumper year, this could be it."

Holland said quail and turkey entered 1987 with plenty of mature birds, and nesting apparently has been good for both species. "Range conditions are so good it's a little difficult to get out and see very many young birds. But I'm really not concerned about losses from flooding, because the rains were spaced out enough to negate high water problems in most areas."

Max Trawick of Kerrville has observed the progress of turkeys in the popular Edwards Plateau region this spring, and he believes prospects are excellent. "Even though May was one of the wettest months ever recorded, turkeys apparently have been able to nest successfully," he said. Nesting success during 1985 produced large numbers of mature birds for broodstock this year, he added.

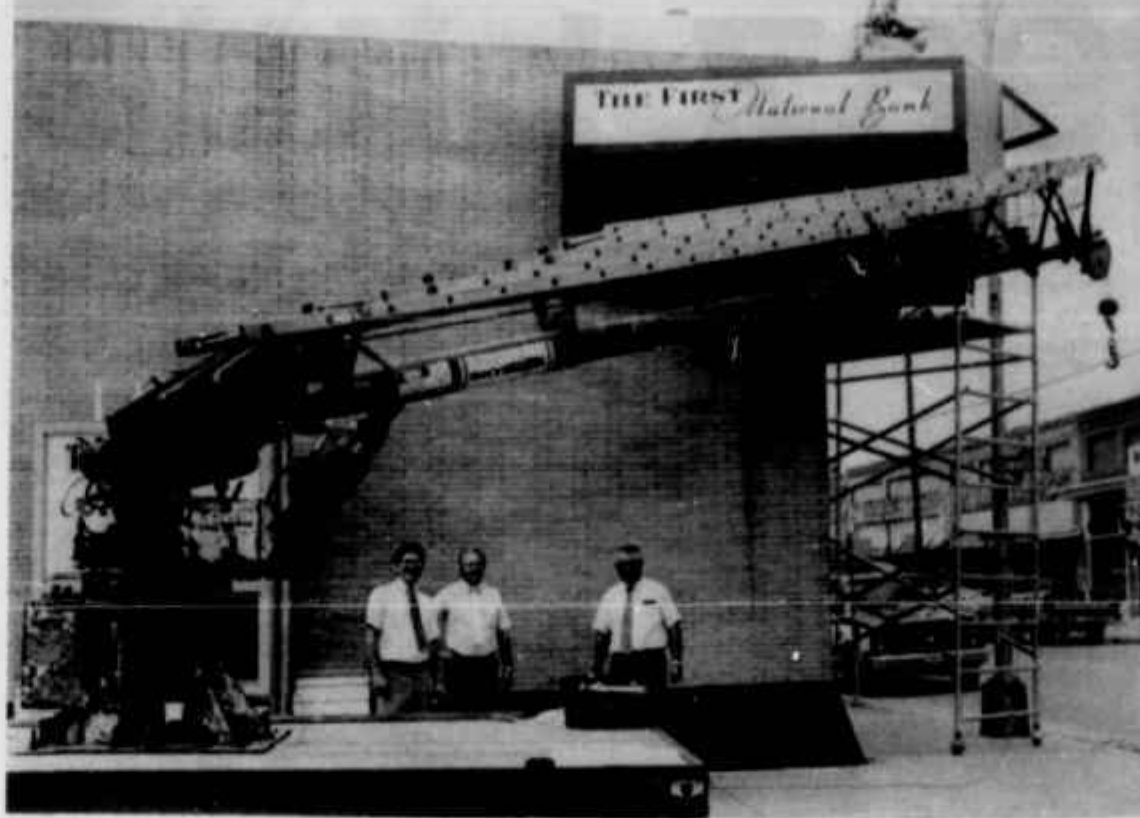
Even the usually-dry Trans-Pecos region of the department's Elephant Mountain Wildlife Management Area near Marfa. "There's so much vegetation right now we can't see many young quail, but plenty of mature pairs," Kilpatrick said. "I think it will be an excellent nesting year for blue quail in this area."

If the May and early-June rains damaged quail and turkey nesting anywhere in the state, it may be in the Oak Prairie and Coastal Prairie region roughly bounded by Austin, Houston and Corpus Christi. Biologist Bob Carroll of La Grange said rising waters from rivers flowing through the region could have hit in the midst of the nesting effort.

"The rain hit while the birds were still in the incubation stage, chances are good they are re-nesting," Carroll said. "But at this point it's just a guessing game." Carroll said in view of the good range conditions he expects at least an average to above average production year for quail and turkeys.

Water safety instructor's course was topic at Red Cross meeting

On June 23 the Colorado County chapter of the American Red Cross met in Columbus. Speakers for the evening were Charlie Moertel, a field service manager from Houston, and Mary Nix, a water safety specialist from Bryan.

Mr. Moertel presented a very informative tape on the history of the American Red Cross organization and Mrs. Nix discussed the organizational format of the Red Cross, including the present and future structure in Colorado County. Since the Red Cross addresses three major areas in its Health Services Education Program (first aid, water safety and boating safety), Mrs. Nix recommended forming a safety committee in Colorado County to centralize the three programs for all the active communities in the area. This committee could then conduct a "need" survey for the area as well as establish county-wide guidelines for all the courses and programs.

Also, the possibility of bringing an instructor here to teach a water safety instructor's course was discussed. The course would be offered on two consecutive weekends from 6-10 p.m. on Fridays and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays. Interested students must be 17 years old and hold a valid advanced lifesaving card. Providing that enough people are interested in taking the course, this would be an ideal opportunity to increase the number of certified swimming instructors in the county. More certified instructors would provide the local communities with bigger and more effective swim programs.
