USDA announces common provisions of 1988 farm programs

Limited crop compliance will be in effect for the 1988 crops of wheat, feed grains (corn, sorghum, barley, oats), upland cotton and rice. Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng announced recently.

To be eligible under the crop compliance provision for price support loans, purchases or payments for these crops, the acreage planted for harvest on a farm may not exceed the crop acreage bases for these commodities.

Other common program provisions applicable for the 1988 crops of wheat, feed grains, cotton and rice include:

Offsetting compliance will not apply, meaning that eligibility for a program payment and a loan for a program commodity on a farm will not be affected by actions taken with respect to that commodity on another farm.

Production of nonprogram crops will not be permitted under the 50/92 provision. To be eligible to receive payments on 92 percent of the permitted acreage, producers must plant at least 50 percent of the permitted acreage to the program crop and devote the remaining permitted acreage to a conserving use.

Production of alternate crops on the designated Acreage Conservation Reserve will not be permitted. As required by law, grazing of ACR land will be permitted at the request of state ASCS committees. Haying of ACR land will not be permitted except under emergency conditions.

The authority for farmers to adjust any crop acreage base with a corresponding downward adjustment in any CAB's on the farm will not be permitted. However, adjustments in CAB's will be considered when producers need to change cropping practices to carry out conservation compliance requirements on highly erodible land.

Generic commodity certificates will continue to be a part of the 1988 farm programs, if needed. The extent of their use will be determined as program payments are made.

Other common program provisions such as hay and grazing on 50/92 CU acreage, advance payments, interest certificates and the program enrollment period will be announced later, Lyng said.

Secretary Richard E. Lyng announced a required 27.5 percent acreage reduction and other provisions of the 1988 wheat program.

Other provisions of the 1988 wheat program include:

A loan rate of \$2.72 a bushel, a 20 percent reduction from the basic loan rate of \$2.71. Secretary Lyng said the downward adjustment was determined necessary to maintain U.S. wheat competitiveness in domestic and international markets. This is the statutory minimum and five percent below the 1987 loan rate of \$2.28.

The established target price is \$4.20 per bushel, the statutory minimum, and down two percent from the 1987 target price.

A paid land diversion program will not be implemented. No marketing loan or related program provisions will be implemented.

Producers will be required to maintain in acreage conservation reserve an area equal to 77.5 percent of program payment acreage.

The upper limits on the farmer-owned reserve quantity will be no 17 percent of estimated domestic and export use for the 1988/89 marketing year.

Volunteers for shark tagging program needed

Wanted: Able-bodied anglers capable of catching and handling sharks off the Texas coast. No pay.

This might not sound like a very attractive job offer, but dedicated offshore fishermen interested in learning more about the movements and life history of the various shark species have played a key role in a federal shark tagging study.

The National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) solicited the help of sport fishermen in Texas and other states, and the anglers responded by tagging almost half the 4,763 sharks tagged during 1986, according to Lee Green, a biologist with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

A total of 239 tagged sharks, representing 22 species, have been recovered. Three of the recovered fish were tagged in Texas waters. Green said.

A bigeye thresher shark tagged near Galveston was recaptured south of Pensacola, Florida, six years later after traveling a minimum of 231 miles.

Green said Texas fishermen interested in participating should write to the NMFS, Northeast Fisheries Center, Narragansett, RI 02882.

Broussard indictments quashed on technicalities

The three indictments against Colorado County sheriff Jim Broussard were thrown out of court last Thursday after special judge Thomas Blackwell heard a day and a half of pre-trial testimony.

The action stunned some people in the courtroom but was similar to a ruling judge Blackwell made in another county the prior week where he also is a visiting judge hearing a case against the Hays County sheriff.

Noting five problems with the indictments in Columbus, centering on technicalities with no mention about the merits of the facts in the case, Blackwell said he felt it was best to "wipe the slate clean."

That gives the state the option of presenting the information to another grand jury, but a decision on that apparently has not yet been made.

District attorney Bud Kirkendall said Tuesday it was his understanding that judge Blackwell told special prosecutors

Puerto Ricans arrested for cocaine possession

Texas ranger Ray Nutt and Eagle Lake chief of police Ben Johnson, acting on information received on an ongoing narcotics investigation, arrested two Puerto Ricans at approximately 12:30 p.m. on Friday, July 17 at the NeCourts Motel for possession of cocaine with the intent to deliver.

The two subjects, Alicia Lopez and Silvio Castaneda, both with addresses, were transferred to the Colorado County Jail and bond was set at \$10,000 each. Approximately three ounces of cocaine and crack as well as narcotics paraphernalia were seized along with several hundred dollars in cash.

question on the wording of the indictments.

After court was dismissed last Thursday, defense attorney Houston Munson said that Jim Broussard is an honest and innocent man. He said problems can be blamed on the county accounting system, especially in the sheriff's department, which Broussard inherited when he became sheriff in 1981.

A new grand jury will be seated in Columbus on Sept. 8. Perhaps as soon as next week, one of the two district judges working with district clerk Harvey Vornsd, will appoint a five-person grand jury commission.

Those five, chosen from around the county, then will draft a list of 20 names as grand jury candidates.

Vornsd said those 20 do not have to be registered voters, but in general must meet voter registration requirements.

As soon as the grand jury candidates are named, they are notified by mail to appear at the courthouse on Sept. 8. One of the district judges will then appear, then the two district judges working with district clerk Harvey Vornsd, will appoint a five-person grand jury commission.

In approving Broussard's motion to quash the indictments, judge Blackwell said there was a question with the subpoena for one out of county witness, a question of whether the grand jury was properly recessed, and a

disputed that claim, but after a half-

hours deliberation, granted the state's motion.

Court was recessed for 15 minutes as Broussard, the two attorneys in the case, and Ranger Nutt went to the jail to get the requested records. They spent next there by four other Texas Rangers and a secretary from the sheriff's office in Houston. One of the rangers said Thursday they were in the jail until after 10:30 p.m. Wednesday night. They had to photocopy some records since their removal would have hindered the daily operation of the jail by Broussard. After Broussard personally gave the rangers the bonds in his possession, and the records of prisoners held at the jail the past six years, he and Munson, along with Volders and Nutt, returned to the courtroom to resume the hearing. Rangers also were after records pertaining to revenue and expense reports.

County-wide election Aug. 8 to decide tax revenue trade

Voters in Colorado County are being called to the polls August 8 to decide whether they want to switch some of the local tax burden away from property taxes and into additional sales taxes.

Early this month county commissioners approved the election, which is made possible by the state legislature. If voters approve, sales tax in the county would increase on January 1, 1988, by one-half cent for each dollar spent on taxable items. However, the county property taxes would be reduced by the amount of money the sales tax would raise.

The purpose is to spread the tax burden more equitably among county residents. Some argue however that lower income people, who own little or no taxable property and thus pay little county tax, are the ones who can least afford the sales tax increase. Others cite the advantage that tax

dollars spent in the county by non-residents reduce taxes for locals.

So far in Texas, 31 counties and 13 cities have adopted the change and one county and one city have voted the proposal down.

The official notice of the county election, and the list of voting places, is in this week's Headlight Classified Advertising pages. For southern Colorado County, the polling places are: Eagle Lake Community Center; Crossroad Grocery in Altair; St. Mary's Parish in Nada; Lions Club Hall in Garwood; Rock Island Community Center; and the Sheridan Community Center.

If approved, the state comptroller's office would provide the county with an estimate of the amount of revenue the sales tax increase would raise. When the county adopts the budget later this summer, it would use that estimate on figuring the affect the

sales tax would have on the county property tax rate.

Under the law, sales taxes are paid to the state comptroller's office. That office then figures the amount of tax belonging to cities and counties, and forwards that amount along. In Colorado County, none of the sales tax paid is returned to the county government, but one cent of the 6.25-cents paid in the three cities are returned there. If the county tax goes over, the first rebate check to the county would be in March of next year.

The law requires the county to establish an excess sales tax revenue fund for all amounts collected in excess of the amount used to reduce the property tax. The excess revenues must be retained in the fund for three years and may be spent only to cover shortfalls in collections of taxes or for other purposes. After three years, the excess funds may be spent for any purpose.

Attractive drugs could be fatal to children

Parents, be alert!

According to police authorities, a form of tattoo called "Blue Star" is readily available in some areas of the United States. It is a small sheet of white paper containing blue stars the size of a pencil eraser. Each "star" is impregnated with LSD and can be removed from the paper to be placed in the mouth. Absorption can occur through the skin simply by handling the paper tattoo.

There are also bright colored paper tabs resembling postage stamps in size, which have pictures of Superman, Mickey Mouse and other Disney characters, but-terflies, clowns, etc. These stamps are packed in a red cardboard box with a picture of Mickey Mouse wrapped in foil in a clear lock-type bag. This package contains 5 one-inch square stamps. This is a new way of selling acid, designed to promote more addicts through appeal and enslavement of children to its addiction.

A young child could happen upon these and have a fatal "trip." It has also been learned that little children could be given a free "tattoo" by older children who want to have some fun or by others cultivating new customers. A red stamp called "Red Pyramid" is being distributed, along with "Micro-Dots" in various colors, which are small as a pinhead, and another kind called "Window Pane" which has a grid that can be cut out. These are all laced with drugs.

If you or your children see any of the above described, DO NOT HANDLE! These drugs are known to react very quickly in your body and some are laced with strychnine. Symptoms are hallucination, mood change and severe vomiting. Get to the hospital as soon as possible, and notify the police. Eagle Lake Concrete Products holds open house

Blocks are shipped mainly in the Houston area, spreading throughout East Texas.

In October, 1985, Houston Concrete Products bought the plant from the Borkowskis. The Houston plant, located on Hardy Street in Houston, was moved to Eagle Lake because of the Hardy Road being constructed. The company still has a yard on McKinney Street in Houston (this yard was originally started by the Borkowskis) and its main office is located at 5111 Woodway.
