

Brock Ashby, Melba Blasek win golf championship

The Eagle Lake Recreation Center golf course held its 1987 Club Championship Tournament this past Sunday afternoon with Brock Ashby claiming the title in the men's division and Melba Blasek taking the ladies' crown.

Thirty-nine members participated in the annual event which took place in ideal weather conditions with some outstanding scores to match. Following play members were treated to a catered meal served by Anna's Catering of Eagle Lake and then held the membership's annual meeting at which time a recap of the year's activities were detailed and election of new

directors were held. Elected by the membership were Gilbert Wilcock, Mano Graham, Larry Broesche and Ernie Sommerlatte, all local members, and Dalton Elam of East Bernard. Other directors whose terms continue for another year are Robby Cook and Bob Ashby.

In tournament action, Ashby captured the men's championship in record fashion, posting a three under par 67 to win the championship flight by 10 strokes. On the first nine, Ashby came in one over par but put together four birdies on the back nine to score his 36-31-67 total. Glen Sunderman took second place with a 77 and Mike

Henry scored an 80 for third place honors.

In the ladies division Blasek claimed her title in a much tighter battle, firing an 84 to slip to second place finisher Stephanie Sunderman who ended the day with an 85. Bob Cook was second at 99 and Frank Pidgeon was third, also with a 99.

Tournament officials expressed thanks to the many people who contributed their time and effort during the day's activities with a special thank you to Pat Cook and Ray Canine in the second flight with Bob

Ullrich.

After the Brahmas' march was halted by a second fumble recovery by Desantiago, the Raiders returned the favor by fumbling back the ball deep in their own territory. East Bernard was able to capitalize with their final score of the game, holding the Raiders offense scoreless the final two minutes of the game.

East Bernard Brahmas upset 7th grade ELMS Raiders 20-14

The seventh grade Eagle Lake Middle School Raiders' football campaign was kicked off last Thursday as the Raiders lost a hard-fought contest to the East Bernard Brahmas. The Brahmas outlasted the Raiders by a score of 20-14.

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Defensive standouts for the seventh grade Raiders were Desantiago, Donald Samora, Terris Alexander and Michael Cenda. Deshaun Cotton led the rushers with a total of 106 yards followed by Roland Hemphill with 57 yards and Broderick Stevenson 15 yards.

The next contest will take the Eagle Lake Middle School seventh grade Raiders to Van Vleet on September 24.

The Raiders received their first kickoff with Raymond Perkins running the ball back four yards. Clipson hands off to Ira Cotton for a gain of three yards. At third and three Clipson bobbles and the Raiders lose control of the ball.

The East Bernard Brahmas offense took control and moved the ball down the field with the Raider defense slowing them down. That's all they did. The Brahmas scored their first touchdown and quickly added two points. At 6:32 into the first quarter the score was Brahmas 8-Raiders 0.

The Brahmas kickoff was called back. On the second attempt, Raymond Perkins brought the ball from the 32 yard line to the 44. Clipson handed off to Perkins again for a first down. The next first down attempt was thwarted four times and the Brahmas, again took control of the ball.

The Brahmas moved the ball steadily and with 1 minute, 36 seconds left in the first quarter, they scored their second touchdown, making their attempt for the two point conversion good.

The second quarter was dominated by the Raider offense as they moved the ball swiftly towards the goal line. Raymond Perkins made the Raider's first touchdown. On the extra point attempt, Clipson handed off to Perkins, who ran in for two points.

The Brahmas received the kickoff and the Raider defense went into action. With 2:41 seconds left in the half Jason Duarte magnificently recovered a fumble. Ira Cotton then ran for a gain of six yards and Clipson carried the ball three yards for the first down. The Raiders fumbled on the hand off and the Brahmas recovered.

The Raiders held them to a one yard gain. With 38 seconds left in the half Michael Graham recovered a fumble on the 41 yard line. The Raider quarterback failed on a pass attempt, but the clock stopped. With three seconds left on the clock, Clipson sailed a forward pass into the end zone as DeWight Douglas leapt into the air to retrieve the ball for the Raiders second touchdown. Raymond Perkins made the two point conversion and the half ended with the score Raiders 16-Brahmas 16.

Another season begins at Eagle Lake Middle School with the Raiders taking a convincing 20-0 win against the East Bernard Brahmas. This avenges the Raiders' only blemish on their record last season as they tied East Bernard in their first game and went on to win their next seven games.

Offensively, the Raiders were led by Reggie Donner, O'Neil Tillman, Merrill Tillman, Jesse Scott and a good offensive line. The scoring started on the kickoff as Reggie Donner raced 80 yards for the first Raider touchdown. The extra point attempt was no good. That ended the scoring for the first half with the Raiders on top 6-0.

The second half scoring was done by O'Neil Tillman on a short run with the extra point pass attempt no good. Jesse Scott scored the next touchdown on a 30 yard run with Merrill Tillman scoring the extra point on a three yard run.

Defensively, the Raiders were outstanding. It was a tremendous defensive effort led by Jesse Scott, Kevin Jackson, Lupe Rodriguez and Gonzalo de la Garza. Jackson led the Raiders with two pass interceptions while Rodriguez and de la Garza both had fumble recoveries. Scott was all over the field and was backed up well by the rest of the Raider defense that consisted of the following: O'Neil Tillman, Joe Rodriguez, Merrill Tillman, Robert Parker, Patrick Weeks, Steve Torres and Reggie Donner.

Defensively, the Raiders had many tackles behind the line of scrimmage and held the Brahmas inside the five yard line. Congratulations to all of the team members for a fine effort.

The Raiders traveled to Van Vleet to take on the Leopolds this Thursday, September 24. Come support your hometown team as they plunge ahead to an undefeated season.

The lone score for the Raiders came in the first quarter with a 10 yard run by Aaron Machac. The extra point was unsuccessful. The half time score stood at 6-0 in favor of the Raiders.

After half time St. Rose made a halfback pass for a 30 yard play and the extra point was stopped, making the score 6-6. About a minute before the game was over, a Raider punt was blocked and recovered by St. Rose giving them another touchdown. The final score ended at 12-6.

Leading rushers for the Raider team were: Andrew Castaneda, 57 yards; Bryant Williams, 40; Norman Board, 12; Machac, passing 3 for 5 for 33 yards; Matthew Ford, one pass, six yards, and Raymond Ford, two passes, seven yards. Ford also caught a pass and handing it off to Williams (which is called a flea-flake).

Leading tacklers were Gallagher and Castaneda, 8 each, and Williams, Botard and Derek Sewell, 5 each.

Next Thursday the team will travel to Weimar for a 5:30 p.m. game against St. Michael's.

Teal season opener here nearly as busy as goose opener

Hunting fever returned to the Eagle Lake and Garwood prairies last Saturday morning as the 1987 Teal season opened for area hunters.

Hunters ready for another season after a long summer made Saturday morning nearly as busy as the

traditional goose and duck hunting season opener each November, according to Sam Center, lieutenant game warden in Eagle Lake. One picker reported more than 300 birds charged with 15 violations and fined \$363 on each count. They spent the night in the county jail in Bellville and were released the next day after posting \$7,500 bond each.

One man pleaded guilty to ten of the counts against him, and not guilty to the other five, while the other two men pleaded not guilty to all 15 counts. If convicted, the 15 counts would mean a total fine of \$5,445.

Closer to home, Center said violations of early shooting hours were not as bad as anticipated. Because farmers are using carbide sounding devices this time of year, to keep birds away from unharvested rice fields, Center said early hunters usually mistake those sounds for shotguns. Only four tickets were written for illegal shooting hour violations. Shooting during Teal season begins at sunrise, not a half hour before sunrise as during goose season.

Three tickets were written for excess bag limits, and eight tickets were written for using the prohibited lead shot.

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Raiders stumble for third loss, 27-6

The mighty Raiders' parade was rained on Friday at Raider Stadium when the Brahmas of East Bernard came calling.

Even with the rain dampening the first quarter or so, it didn't take long for 2-A East Bernard to get on the boards.

The final score was East Bernard 27, Raiders 6.

But, the game wasn't all dark clouds. After the game head coach Clifton Darden said that even though the team lost, he saw some promising moments. "Last week after we looked at the films I didn't see that promise," Darden, who coaches the backfield stone problems since the season opened, and spent the early part of last week in a Houston hospital. It was evident after the game that the pain from the operation to remove the stones was still prevalent.

Rice also was able to work the ball almost five minutes longer than East Bernard; they just weren't able to move it car enough.

The Raiders had to grind out their ball movements on the ground as quarterback Kevin Long missed on all five pass attempts this past week. The East Bernard visitors only connected on three passes but racked up 82 yards in the air.

It seemed the Raiders could move the ball fairly well, until the team got within sight of the end zone. Douglas Tillman had 16 carries for 86 yards, including a 27 yard pailer. Clarence Weeks had only five carries but accounted for 32 yards, and freshman

causing a fumble which Raider Louis Richardson recovered.

But, the two yard line was as close as the Raiders could get the ball to ward another touchdown.

The Raiders beat East Bernard when the two teams played at this time last year, giving Rice a 2-1 record at that time. So far this year the Raiders are winless in three outings and are facing tough opponents for the next two weeks before district play opens Oct. 9.

This week, senior Johnell Diggins statistics put him in 9th place among all former Raiders in the total tackles category. He has 55 this season already, giving him 242 during his high school playing days. He just passed Darrell Dancy this past week. He could well move into fifth place among all Raider players, as he is within 20 tackles of fifth place John Schneider (260); sixth place Bruce Polach (258); seventh place Dwayne Pangel (250), and eighth place John W. Smith (248).

Also, senior Douglas Tillman, with 167 yards rushing through three games, has picked up 569 career Raider yards leaving him 150 yards away from cracking into the top ten.
