Americans eating more U.S. rice

American rice consumption is on the upswing. The Economic Research Service of the United States Department of Agriculture reported that per capita consumption of rice increased from 15.3 lbs. in 1983 to 17.4 lbs. in 1985, up 12 percent.

Bill Goldsmith, executive vice president of the Rice Council for market development, said, "American consumers are realizing the tremendous versatility of rice and appreciating that it can be good for them and not fattening."

The report, which surveyed the 34 milling and repackaging firms that produce 95% of total 1984/85 rice shipments, reflects consumption of all types of American-grown rice. The study found that regular-milled white rice accounted for 77% of rice consumed directly as food, while parboiled, precooked and other specialty rices accounted for the remainder.

Rice is used in many food products and it is also an important grain used in the brewing of beer. Of the 17.4 lbs. consumed by Americans, 13.4 lbs. were enjoyed as the familiar grain, as well as other products such as flavored rice mixes, frozen foods, breakfast cereals, soups and baby foods.

Nutrition experts recommend that anywhere from 50-60% of total calories come from complex carbohydrates, such as rice. In 1980, the U.S. Dietary Guidelines encouraged Americans to eat more complex carbohydrates, recommendations that may account for the rise in rice consumption.

Rice, a source of B-complex vitamins, is typically enriched during milling to protect against the loss of these nutrients.
