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NOTICE OF ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS }
COUNTY OF COLORADO }
TO ALL RESIDENT QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF COLORADO COUNTY WATER CONTROL AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 2

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in Colorado County Water Control and Improvement District No. 2, of Colorado County, Texas, on October 17, 1987, in accordance to an order duly entered by the Board of Directors of the District on August 26, 1987, which order reads substantially as follows:

AN ORDER CALLING A BOND ELECTION TO BE HELD BY THE COLORADO COUNTY WATER CONTROL AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 2, MAKING PROVISION FOR THE CONDUCT OF THE ELECTION AND RESOLVING OTHER MATTERS INCIDENT AND RELATED TO SUCH ELECTION.

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors (the Board) of the Colorado County Water Control and Improvement District No. 2 (the District) has determined that it is necessary to call an election for the purpose of submitting the proposition set forth for the grant of authority therein contained; therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF COLORADO COUNTY WATER CONTROL AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 2:

SECTION 1: An election shall be held on the 17th day of October, 1987, in the District, which date is forty-five (45) or more days from the date of adoption of this Order, for the purpose of submitting the following proposition:

PROPOSITION
"Shall the Board of Directors of the Colorado County Water Control and Improvement District No. 2 of Colorado County, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds in the amount of ONE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$150,000), maturing serially or otherwise, within the discretion of the Board of Directors, not to exceed twelve (12) years from their date, for the purpose of paying the costs of constructing, purchasing, repairing and improving and extending waterworks and sanitary sewer systems, and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on such bonds by the levy of a sufficient tax, without limit as to rate or amount, upon all taxable property within the District, in the manner provided by applicable law, and any issue or series of said bonds to bear interest per annum (payable annually or semi-annually) at any rate or rates (fixed, floating, variable or otherwise) as may be determined within the discretion of the Board of Directors, provided that such rate or rates of interest shall not exceed the maximum rate per annum authorized by law at the time of the issuance of any issue or series of said bonds?"

SECTION 2: The summary of the engineer's estimate of the probable cost of constructing or purchasing the proposed improvements and the incidental expenses connected with the construction or purchase thereof is as follows:

SECTION 3: Paper ballots shall be used for the holding of said election. Paper ballots shall also be used for absentee voting by personal appearance and by mail. The official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with the Texas Election Code, as amended, so as to permit the voters to vote "For" or "Against" the aforesaid proposition which shall appear on the ballot substantially as follows:

PROPOSITION
"The issuance of bonds and the levy of taxes to pay for the bonds."

SECTION 4: The District shall constitute one election precinct for the holding of said election. The polling place for the holding of said election shall be at the Lion's Club Hall, Garwood, Texas.

Clara Lohrries is hereby appointed Presiding Judge for the holding of said election, and Lucille Hill is hereby appointed Alternate Presiding Judge. The Presiding Judge shall appoint additional clerks in order that there will be not less than two (2) nor more than four (4) qualified clerks to assist in the holding of said election, provided that if the Presiding Judge appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of the clerks. The appointment of such clerks must include a person fluent in the Spanish language to serve as a clerk to render oral aid in the Spanish language to any voter desiring such aid at the polls on the day of said election. In the absence of the Presiding Judge named above, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall perform the duties of the Presiding Judge.

On election day the polls shall be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Mr. Jerry Seidow Jr. (whose mailing address is 600 Townsend, P. O. Box 317, Garwood, Texas 77421) is hereby appointed the clerk for absentee voting for said election and the District's Office located at 600 Townsend, Garwood, Texas, which is a public place within said District, is hereby designated the place for absentee voting. The hours designated for voting by personal appearance shall be from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., except Saturdays, Sundays and official state holidays, during the period required by law for conducting absentee voting.

An Absentee Voting Board is hereby established for the purpose of processing absentee voting results, and Clara Lohrries is hereby appointed Presiding Judge of the Absentee Ballot Board. Said Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) nor more than four (4) qualified persons to serve as members of the Absentee Ballot Board.

SECTION 5: All resident qualified electors of the District shall be permitted to vote at said election. The election shall be held and conducted in accordance with the provisions of the Texas Election Code, as amended, and Chapter 51 of the Texas Water Code, as amended, and as may be required by law. All election materials and proceedings shall be printed in both the English and Spanish languages.

SECTION 6: A substantial copy of this Order shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice, including a Spanish translation thereof, shall be published once a week for four (4) consecutive weeks in a newspaper with general circulation in the county in which all or part of the District is located. The first publication of the notice, in both the English and Spanish languages, shall be at least twenty-eight (28) days before the day of the election.

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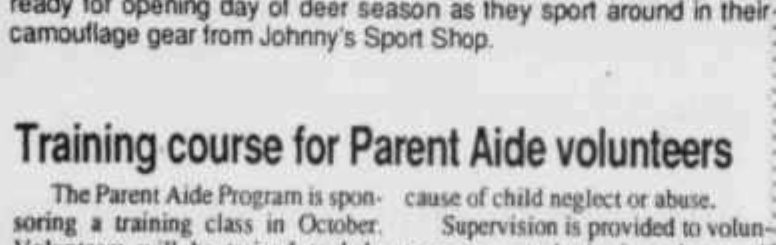
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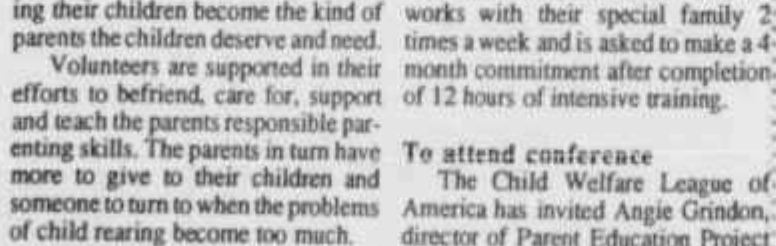
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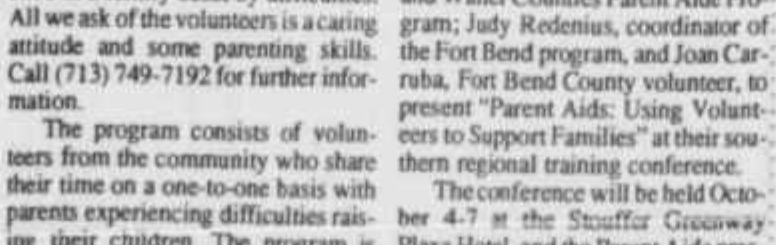
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Waterfowl Festival weekend successful

The 1987 Eagle Lake Waterfowl Festival, held at the Community Center the weekend of September 18-20, was a success, the committee which put it on announced this week. With all bills paid it appears the festival will net approximately \$6,000 with the preview party on Friday evening, new event at this year's festival, earning the majority of the money.

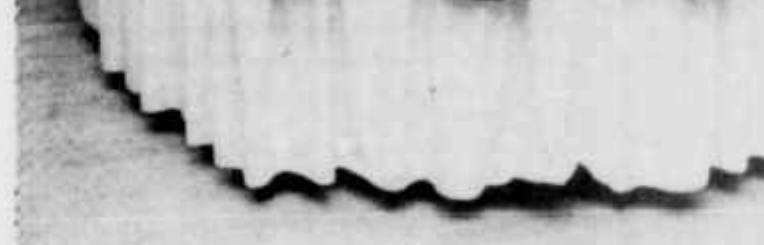
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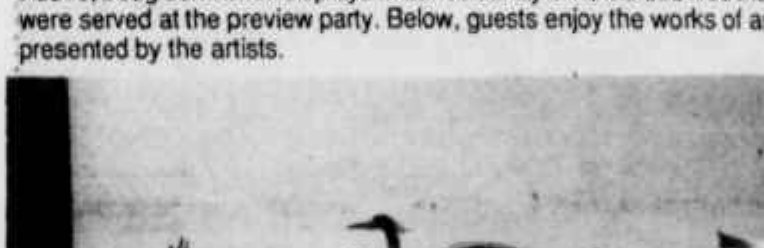
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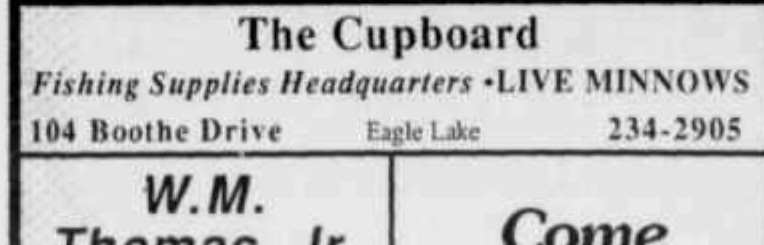
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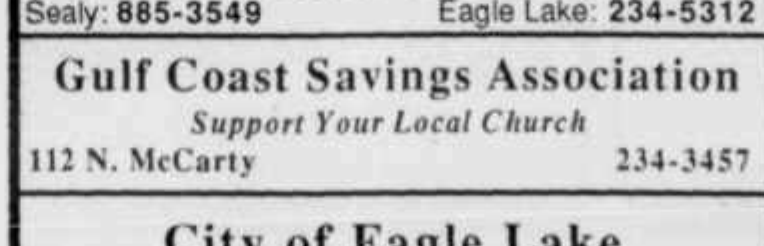
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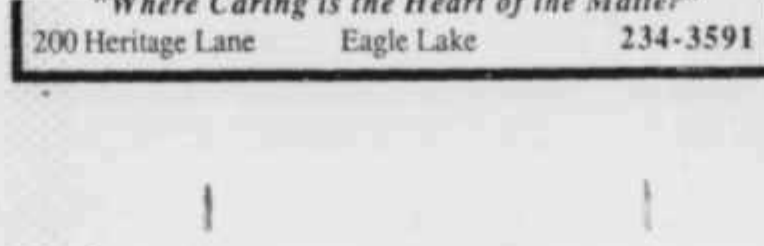
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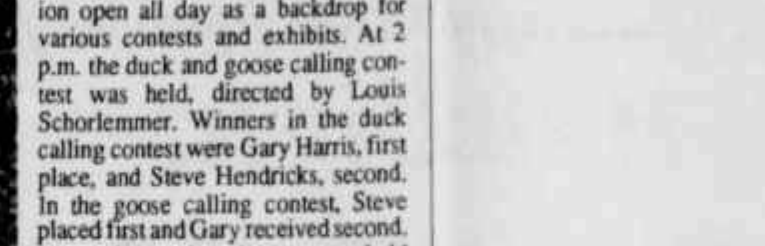
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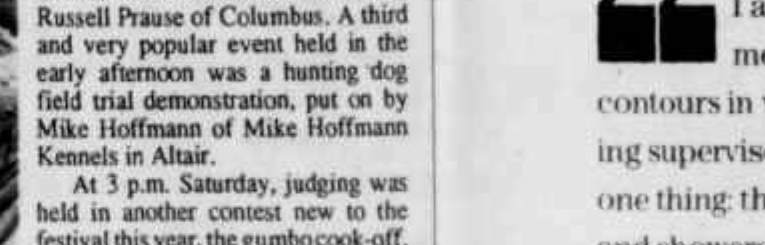
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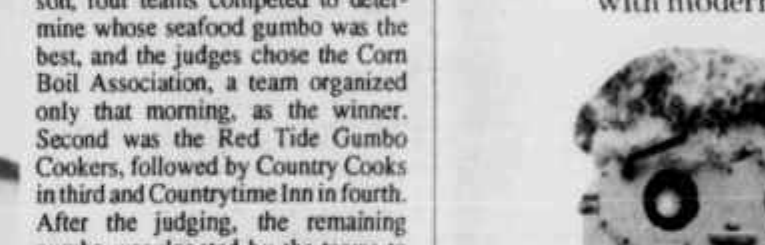
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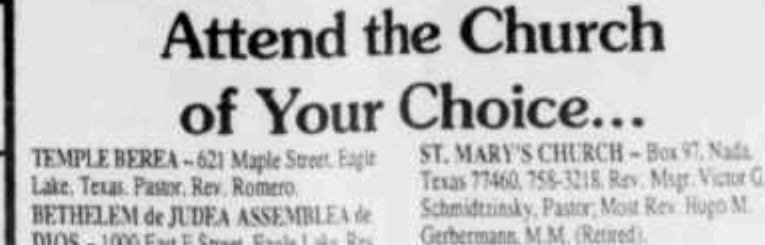
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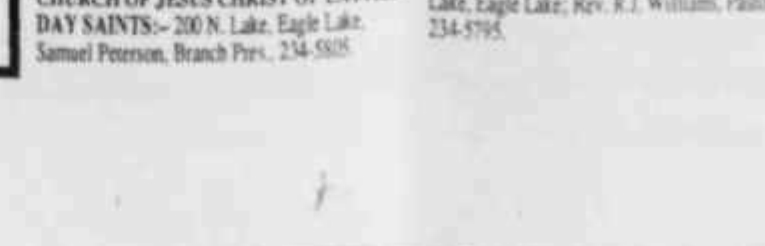
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Come and Take It celebration Oct. 2-4

Gonzales is located 70 miles east of San Antonio and about 60 miles south of Austin. It is just 15 miles south of I-10 via Hwy 183 and 97 or FM 304. The town is full of history, and beautiful Victorian homes dating from the 1890s.

On Sunday, September 20, the art show and arts and crafts area opened at 10 a.m. Later in the day, at 1 p.m., winners in the silent auction were announced, and they came to claim the items they had bought. The festival concluded with the end of the art show at 5 p.m. Sunday afternoon.

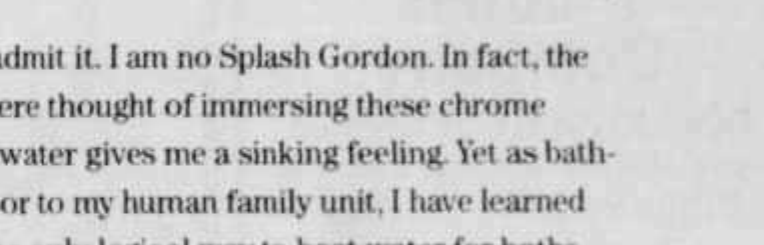
