The competition continues again, and when Columbus got the ball with only a few minutes remaining, they went to work. Plughaupt got on the passing route again, connecting with Tyrone Whitehead on one play. The Raiders managed one sack, but still the Cards moved the ball down to the Raider 23.

From there Plughaupt tossed one into the end zone for his only interception of the night. It was snared by Raider junior Tiger Pratt.

Columbus wasted no time getting back in the action as the momentum swung to the Cardinals. Plughaupt engineered a ten-play, 65-yard drive that ended with Glen Peikert taking a one-yard run for the score. Chavis kicked another good one and with 6:52 remaining in the quarter, the Cards lead 14-13.

The Cardinal defense then became as tough as their offense, holding the Raiders to one first down before forcing a punt. That snap was almost over the punter's (Kevin Long) head but he still got it away. Starting out from the Raider 45, the Cardinals wasted no time. They moved the ball down to the Raider 11, then Plughaupt scored on an 11-yard keeper. Chavis made his third extra point kick of the night, posting the final score 21-13.

The Cards take the win, and a first-week tie in the standings, into their second district game this Friday night, hosting the winless Hempstead Bobcats in a 7:30 p.m. game. Rice, now 1-4-0, 0-1-0, host Belleville, 3-2-0, 0-0-1, in a 7:30 p.m. contest in Raider Stadium.

The Raiders spent the better part of last Friday night trying to keep Brian Chavis from advancing the ball for Columbus. They weren't very successful as Chavis was instrumental in the Cardinal's 21-13 victory.

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Columbus stops Raiders 21-13

The "new" season for area high school football opened last Friday with Columbus Cardinals the victors over the Rice Raiders 21-13. The Cards and Sealy share the first-week undefeated spot in the standings.

The fact that it was the first game of District 23-3A competition may have been the difference in the teams' performances, compared to the five pre-district games. The game was a real fan-pleaser. There were few mistakes on either side, and there was no reason for anyone to leave until the game was over.

There was a difference between the first and second halves though as Rice appeared dominant in the first two quarters. At half time the Raiders led 13-7.

But, the second half belonged to the Cardinals who came out firing in the third quarter. They racked up 14 more points in that stanza, taking the lead and never relinquishing it.

In the scoreless first quarter, the Raiders received the opening kick and except for four downs by the Cardinals, Rice held the ball for the entire 12 minutes. Rice's first possession consumed nine plays but the tough Cardinal defense kept the ball in Raider territory. At one point the

Raiders rammed the ball across the mid-stripe with Cardinal Brock Plughaupt kept his cool and fired downfield to connect with Roy Glover for an 18 yard gain. From the Raider 40, the Cards then moved another seven yards on one of the many runs by prolific Brian Chavis.

With the punt to Columbus, the Rice defense became just as tough, allowing the Cards to move more ahead eight yards on one play, but back nine yards in two others. Quarterback Craig Plughaupt had to yield with the Cards punting. To help Columbus, Rice was called with a 15-yard penalty moving the ball back to their own 35.

This time the Raider offense got it together, keeping the ball on the ground for the most part, picking up three first downs. Raider QB Kevin Long made a connection for his only completion of the night. It was a well thrown pass for 29 yards.

On the first play in the second quarter, Long ran the ball into the endzone from the Columbus one. The Scott Ripper PAT was good.

The second Cardinal possession could have ended with another four snaps, but on fourth and four when Columbus was punting, the Raiders were called with their third penalty of the night. It gave the Cards their first
