TDA inspectors enforce cotton plow-up law in Southeast Texas

The deadline for destroying cotton stalks in several Southeast Texas counties is Tuesday, Oct. 20. Brenham District Supervisor Charles Leamon, of the Texas Department of Agriculture, recently announced.

State law requires all cotton fields in Austin, Colorado, Fayette, Lavaca, Walter and Washington counties to be plowed up by midnight October 20. Cotton producers who fail to meet the deadline are subject to prosecution, Leamon said.

TDA officials expect this to be the last season that cotton stalk destruction designed to control pink bollworm and boll weevil infestations is enforced under current laws.

On Sept. 1, a new boll weevil law, passed during the recently ended legislative session, went into effect. The new law sets up guidelines for establishing pest management zones, each of which would have a governing board, said Paul Martin, TDA's acting

So far, TDA has sent 17 letters affecting nearly 2,700 acres of cotton in the Valley that failed to meet an earlier cotton stalk destruction deadline. The fields in violation will continue to be monitored to determine which will require additional action.

Failure to comply with the plow-up deadline is punishable by a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$500 or by imprisonment for not less than 10 days nor more than 30 days or may be punishable by both a fine and imprisonment. The penalties for failing to abide by the quarantine are applicable to the cotton producer and the landowner.

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State probably will ask Broussard trial be moved

The pre-trial hearing for Colorado County sheriff Jim Broussard is scheduled for 10 a.m. next Thursday, Oct. 29, in the district courtroom in Columbus. The hearing is open to the public.

Although it would be unusual if none were filed, Special state prosecutor Jim Vollers of Austin said Tuesday that he "probably" would file a motion asking the trial be moved out of Colorado County. He has indicated he would file several motions. Earlier this year one of the state's motions was to have the trial moved but that motion was not ruled on because the original three indictments against the sheriff were voided by visiting judge Thomas Blackwell on legal technicalities.

Broussard now is under six indictments issued by the Colorado County grand jury that has been meeting this summer.

This past Monday, the summer grand jury met again, with special prosecutor Vollers on hand, but no other indictments were returned.

City moves toward Nov. 2 sale of airport land

At a special meeting of Eagle Lake city council on Monday night of this week, council voted to proceed with the selling process for nearly 20 acres of land at the Municipal Airport, pending agreement by the purchaser, Gulf South Airmobile of Houston.

The meeting was called to review and amend the earnest money contract signed in August by Gulf South and the city. The contract apparently contains a clause allowing either side to suggest contract changes in writing. Such changes then need to be approved by the other party.

Council approved a motion that suggests five changes to the document signed on August 5 by a Gulf South representative, and on August 7 by mayor Lanny Powers. The earnest money contract changes are:

1) Delete any reference to an Airport Master Plan. The contract calls for the city to complete projects called for in a master plan, but no master plan has been created. The Texas Aeronautical Commission gave the city a suggested plan a year or two ago, but it was a suggestion and was not officially approved by council. Former city manager Robert Klockman had drafted in late August a letter to Source Architects of Houston since that firm was interested in developing an airport master plan, but it was not seen by council nor was it ever mailed. Phillip N. Ferguson of Eagle Lake has interests in both Gulf South and Source Architects.

2) Delete paragraph that says the contract should not be recorded in any public record. While councilman Larry Dulany said it was his understanding that such a paragraph was standard among private parties, council agreed that any contract they approve for the city automatically is public record. The clause said that should the document become public record, the contract would become void.

3) Change references to city utilities. The contract called for the city to bring city water and sewer service to several points within the 20-acre tract. However, as councilman Vic Corman said, the original understanding was that the city would treat the property as any other in the city, and only bring the sewer and water lines to the property at a point nearest current city services. Although no estimate has been made for the cost of extending

those services, Corman said it is likely a sewer lift station will be needed. A prototype, low-cost lift station installed in the Austin-Clippson road sewer extension is working well and could be used in this case.

4) The date for completion of the airport runway widening and repaving was changed from Nov. 1 to Jan. 1, 1988. Mayor Powers said the parties understood that was only a "goal" date, and that there was no provision for action should that date not be met. Council also inserted a sentence in the contract saying that no penalty would be meted out should the work not be completed by Jan. 1.

5) Set the closing date for Nov. 2, 1987.

Apparently, if Gulf South does not accept the changes, and council does not agree to withdraw them, the contract could be cancelled.

Council also touched briefly on the repaving and widening aspect of the project. The city's new engineer, Mercer Associates of Edna looked at the runway last Friday and suggested that the 25-foot widening be split on either side of the runway to preserve the "crown" of the strip. He also discussed a cold-mix paving method, rather than hot mix as approved May 28 by council (and contained in the earnest money contract). Council took no action.

The contract is a multi-page document and contains many other provisions. One is that the city is requiring the buyer to petition the city to annex the property into the city limits. That would put the property on the tax role.
