The purpose of the Colorado SWCD, with headquarters in Columbus, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As one of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Engstrom will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas Soil Conservation District law.

In other areas of leadership, Engstrom has been active in the SWCD district for 30 years or more as director, is the Lions Club president, etc. He has been recognized director of Fayette Savings Advisory Board in Columbus, director of Rice Council of member of County Water Council of LCRA.
