Garwood/Nada Community News

On Saturday, October 17, the voters of the Garwood Water District went to the polls to decide on the fate of a \$150,000 bond issue. The voters decided by the vote of 30-28 that the bonds were to be issued. The water district plans to sell the bonds to the Farmers Home Administration, hopefully at the present interest rate of 7.75%. The money raised by the sale of these bonds will be used to replace approximately 19,000 feet of galvanized pipe that is twenty-seven years old and deteriorating. The new lines will be a two inch, high quality PVC pipe that is non-corrosive.

It will be necessary to raise the tax rate to 27 cents per \$100 of assessed value in order to pay for the current sewer system debt plus expenses on the new bonds. The directors of the water district feel that this action is necessary and should ensure the customers of continued quality water service.

One disappointing aspect of the vote was that only fifty-eight people responded to such an important and costly local issue. Our community has always been known for people who care and will act when the need arises. The frightening part is that people simply did not care enough to vote or thought that their vote was not important. The closeness of the results should show everyone just how vital each person's vote can be.

The citizens will have another opportunity to vote yet other issues on November 3. We should remember that voting is not just a right or privilege. It is a responsibility and sacred duty that many have sacrificed their lives to defend. Make plans to do your part to increase the voter turnout so that we can once more be proud of our heritage of caring and action.
