Garwood/Sheridan teams end season on losing note

The Garwood/Sheridan seventh grade football team lost to Schulenburg's seventh graders 12-0 last Thursday at the Sheridan football field. Leading rushers, offensively, were Jesse George, 24 yards; Ken Henderson, 19, and Will Atkins, 31. Defensively, the leading tacklers were Aaron Machac with 13, Garland Axel and John Carey, 11 each, and Jesse George, Ken Henderson and Jimmy Brzozowski, seven each.

This also was a bad night for the Garwood/Sheridan eighth grade team as they lost 44-6 to the Schulenburg eighth graders. Mark Ybarra ran a kickoff back for a 60-yard run to make the lone touchdown. Defensively, Matthew Gallagher and Ybarra were the leading tacklers. Ybarra also made a fumble recovery and Raymond Ford intercepted a pass for the Raiders.

JV offense sputters...defense doesn't

In past weeks while the strong wishbone offensive attack of the Raider JV team seemed to control most of the game, the defense just kind of quietly did its job. Not so last Thursday, October 22. While the offense seemed to sputter and turn the ball over, the defense rose to the occasion time after time stopping Hempstead dead in their tracks to finish the game in a scoreless tie.

Coach Sanders, when asked to comment, said "Everyone deserves a bad night once in awhile. I hope Thursday was the only bad night for us. I think our offense did not play well for two reasons. First, it was very wet and sloppy. Second, we did not block for each other. The linemen were not firing off the ball and backs forgot how important it is to block for each other." This showed in the stats. Rice only had 124 total yards. In Cotton had 54, Raymond Perkins 31, Casey Clipson 25 and Randy Perkins 14.

The defense, on the other hand, played very well. On one occasion, after a blocked Raider punt that rolled all the way down to the Raider's own one yard line, the defense not only stopped Hempstead, but set them back 24 yards.

Colorado County ASCS News

1986 final deficiency payments for corn and grain sorghum:

The corn payment for 1986 is \$1.11 per bushel of which \$.63 per bushel is subject to the \$50,000 limit and \$.48 per bushel is not subject to the \$50,000 limit.

The grain sorghum payment is \$1.06 per bushel of which \$.60 per bushel is subject to the \$50,000 limit and \$.46 per bushel is not subject to the \$50,000 limit.

Fifty percent of the final payment was paid in cash and 50% was paid in Commodity Certificates. The part that was paid in cash was reduced by 4.3% Gramm-Rudman. Additional yield deficiency payments were made entirely in certificate.

Removal requires approval

Producers with Commodity Credit farm-stored loans must obtain authorization from the ASCS office before commencing, rotating, moving or selling loan grain.

Penalties will be imposed when loan grain is removed or disposed of before repayment or before a release authorization is obtained from the Colorado County ASCS office. To avoid administrative penalties and liquidated damages, farmers should contact the ASCS office for specific details before moving any farm-stored grain.

The Colorado County ASCS office will be closed Wednesday, November 11 in observance of Veterans Day and on November 26 (Thursday), in observance of Thanksgiving.

Season opening early with greater expectations

Last year when the Waterfowl Season dawned on the Prairie, the anticipation was high — both from the hunter's viewpoint as well as from those in the area who depend on the season as a major portion of their economic well-being.

The anticipation is still there, but the view is a little different. If you know anything about last year's season — and some don't want to remember too well — you know there was not an abundance of geese, although duck hunters fared well enough.

This year, according to comments from area guides who are tuned in to the Central Flyway reports, the hatch has improved. That improves the opportunity for more young birds to be in the fields. For you inexperienced hunters, it's the young birds you want to see as the sun rises. Those birds which have been down here before understand what those booms and pops mean, and thus shy away from them.

Another item you can chalk up on the positive side of the ledger this year is the weather. Cold weather fronts already have shoved many birds southward, as our annual opening weekend survey reveals.

Each year, the weekend before the season opens, we trek out onto the prairie just to see what's doing. This year was more entertaining than in past years, as the editor was joined by Bill Appelt, owner of the Jimmy Reed Hunting Club, and by Doug Schwenn, owner of the Sports-

man's Restaurant in Eagle Lake. Meeting at Doug's restaurant before sunrise, just like a hunting morning, we headed southeast. The first thing we learned was that we could have slept an extra hour. Most birds still were on the roost. With the second rice harvest getting underway, there's plenty of food available, and the birds didn't have to do too much scouting around.

After we had a look at some of the fields around "The Vineyard" area (the land was a grape-growing area, it once belonged to a family named Vineyard), we headed north. Still east of Eagle Lake, we were looking over some of the fields farmed by Vic and Wayne Corman. It seems the brothers were out working and they offered to take us somewhere south of Lissie to their holding pond. If you gave me a map I doubt I could find it again, but that's where we found a decent concentration of birds.

Earlier in the week I talked to Carl Hopkins who offers day hunting and seasonal leases in the Katy Brookshire area. He agreed that prospects for this year are brighter than in 1986, but there still may not be as many geese in the area as previous years.

If that holds true, the consensus is that hunters going out on opening weekend may have to stay in the field a little longer, but they should get their fair share of shooting — and birds.
