Texas Farm Bureau to compile policy recommendations for annual meeting

The Texas Farm Bureau resolutions committee, consisting of 41 farmers and ranchers from across the state, will meet in Waco November 9-11 to complete state and national policy recommendations which voting delegates will consider November 29-December 2 at the 54th TFB annual meeting in Lubbock.

Resolutions pertaining to state matters approved by voting farmers and ranchers in Lubbock will become state policy for the general farm organization during 1988.

Adopted resolutions pertaining to

national policy will be forwarded to the American Farm Bureau Federation annual meeting January 10-14 in New Orleans, Louisiana.

The resolutions committee is composed of three leaders from each of TFB's 13 districts: TFB vice president John Baker of Temple, chairman; and David McMahon, Princeton, chairman of the TFB young farmer and rancher advisory committee.

Leonard Schuler, TFB state director from Hallettsville, is vice chairman and Don Smith, TFB state director from Sulphur Springs, is secretary.

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Harrison speaks to Pilot Club

The Pilot club was pleased to have Margo Harrison as the guest speaker at their program meeting on Wednesday, October 28. The district project for this year is adult literacy and the club was introduced to the literacy problem in our area by Mrs. Harrison.

Margo was introduced by president-elect, Nancy Lang and began her program with an illustration of what actually goes on in a tutoring lesson. She realized how great the problem of illiteracy was in our area and decided to do something to help these people.

After completing the "Lauback Way to English" course in Houston, she along with the help of Mrs. Rose Lange began tutoring. Margo finds tutoring a very gratifying experience. Students are so eager to learn and become your special friends.

According to Margo, there are twenty-seven million Americans who cannot read, write, or comprehend on an adult level. One out of five Americans are illiterate with Texas ranking third in the nation in the number of uneducated adults.

Today there are approximately six tutors in Eagle Lake handling students. In the past year and a half, some

sixty students have been tutored. Several members of the Pilot club have already completed the fifteen hour course for the "Lauback Way to English" and are already tutoring. The course will be offered again in January, and more members hope to attend at that time.

In her closing remarks, Margo thanked the Pilot club for getting involved in this worthwhile program.

Men turning 26 required to register

Men who turn 26 during the remainder of 1987 will be reaching an important milestone according to the Selective Service System.

Young men born in 1961 were required to register with Selective Service in July of 1980 when President Carter reinstated the registration requirement. These men turn 26 in 1987. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept a young man's registration after he has reached his 26th birthday.

Harold Doyle, Texas Selective Service state director, warned that, with few exceptions, a man who fails to register before turning 26 will be permanently forfeit his eligibility for federal student financial aid, job training benefits and most federal employment. Additionally, non-registrants face possible prosecution as felons.

Texas has registered nearly one million men since 1980.
