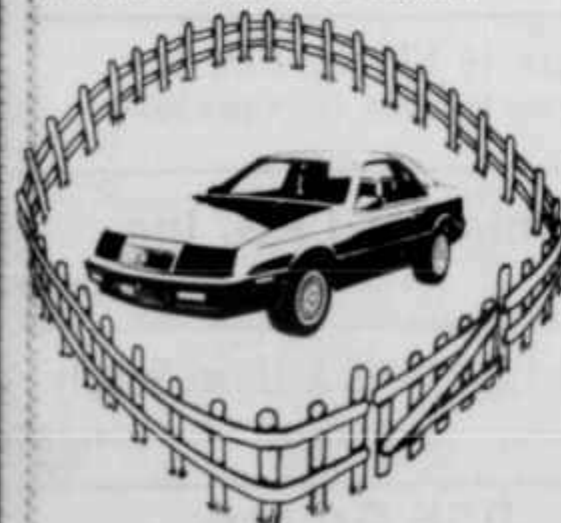

School board awards baseball field contracts

The Rice Consolidated ISD School Board met Monday, November 30 to review bids and award contracts for the improvement to the baseball facility at the high school.

The bids were divided into individual units of work to provide local contractors the opportunity to participate in the bidding. Only Phillip Shindler of Shindler Electric was the only local bidder.

Bids were made on relocating existing fencing, new fencing, relocating the existing stands, as well as the cost of new stands. The new stands would seat 140 on each side of home base.

Bids also were submitted for six wood pole lights and the cost of lighting the existing field or relocating the field and lighting the new location.

In the discussion of whether to relocate the field or leave it where it is, it was pointed out by Steve Orsak, consultant with Sports Facilities Co., that if the field is relocated, it would be necessary to provide lighting. The game schedule would then allow night games. Lighting the field would remain an option, only if it was not moved.

King pointed out that some of the work could be handled by district employees. The board then rejected all other bids.

In other business the board approved Sue Ellen Wetzel for ESL and Chapter 1 at the Eagle Lake Primary. They also approved Mary Elizabeth Christal, Dorothy M. Milligan and Lisa Peavy to the substitute teacher list for 1987-88.

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
