Columbus receives national honor for 1992

The year 1992 marks the Quincentennial (500 years) of Christopher Columbus' discovery of America in 1492, and plans are developing throughout the country to coordinate all cities named Columbus, and work with all other states to unify efforts for the year long celebration which kicks off in October of 1991, and climaxes in October of 1992.

Since early summer the Columbus area Chamber of Commerce has been in direct contact with other people involved in this same effort, and through the support and assistance of State Representative Robert Saunders, and our other legislators, Congressman Greg Laughlin and Senator Phil Gramm, we received the distinct honor of receiving a proclamation (passed in the house of Representatives and the Senate), and signed by Governor Bill Clements, last Friday, January 6.

Letters of support from our

Mayor, County Judge, and from all the historical organizations in the county were of utmost importance to aid us in receiving this honor.

Corpus Christi, long recognized as a site prominent in the early Spanish exploration of the Americas, is also commemorating this historic event and was selected as the official city of the state celebration of the Quincentennial year.

However, in consideration of our own historic past, and the participation of our city in the activities of the

Columbus Day USA Association celebration in Columbus, Ohio since 1971, our connection is now recognized on the national level, and we are proud of this announcement: "Resolved, that the 71st Texas Legislature, 2nd called Session, hereby designate Columbus, Texas as the Official 1992 Quincentennial Town of Texas for the national celebration of the 500th anniversary of Columbus' discovery of the New World."

Further details will be reported as they develop.

Elected to serve three-year terms on the Christ Church vestry were Ann Duncan and Judi Johnson. George Weller was appointed Treasurer, with retiring Treasurers Ethel and A. B. Cone being given heart-felt thanks for their long role in this important church service. Rollin Baker accepted an appointment by the Rector for another year as Senior Warden.

CPL offering assistance for December freeze

Customers of Central Power and Light Co. may see higher than normal electric bills due to the freezing temperatures recorded in December, but CPL is offering help.

"The record cold spell created personal and economic hardship among our customers," said Bob Carey, CPL president and chief executive officer. "We know that our customers used much more electricity during December, and we expect their bills will be higher than usual. To assist those having trouble paying the bill, CPL is willing to work out payment plans on an individual basis."

In order to make arrangements, customers need to contact their area CPL office to discuss their specific situation. Unless special arrangements are made with the area office, CPL will follow its normal billing procedures.

"As always, we ask that if customers know there is going to be a problem paying their electric bills, that they notify our office. Prompt notification allows us to identify which of a variety of programs will best assist each individual," said Carey.

In many of the cities CPL serves the late December freeze plunged temperatures to the coldest on record, causing electric consumption to increase.

At noon on December 22, CPL customers used a record 3,145 megawatts of electricity. "This was unusual because electric use on our system usually hits new records in the summer because of our warm climate," said Carey.

The new record for electric use bested the earlier record of 3,044 megawatts, recorded on August 31, 1989.

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Colorado-Fayette Medical Center lawsuit settled

The Board of Trustees of Colorado-Fayette Medical Center has announced that a settlement has been reached in the long-standing lawsuit between the Hospital and three of the contractors that helped build the Hospital's replacement facility in 1986. Mellon-Stuart Company, the Hospital's general contractor, and Frey Mechanical Contractors and Paul Miller and Associates, two of the

subcontractors that were involved in the project, have agreed to release all of their claims against the Hospital as well as pay the Hospital a cash settlement of \$255,090. This cash settlement, along with the release of all claims, represents a settlement amount close to \$500,000 in favor of the Hospital. The cash settlement will be paid in varying portions by the contractors.

Mellon-Stuart company initially filed suit against the hospital in Federal Court in December, 1987, after the Hospital withheld part of the company's final payment claiming that the Contractor failed to complete certain contractual obligations. Mellon-Stuart also made numerous claims for payment for extra work. In January 1988, the Hospital filed a countersuit against Mellon-Stuart and the other contractors in State Court. A Federal Judge ultimately ordered all parties to resolve their claims through arbitration which began in October, 1989. A settlement agreement was reached halfway through the formal arbitration.

"I think the Hospital Board of Trustees should be commended for making a lot of tough decisions during the past two years," noted Randy Bacus, Hospital Administrator. "This was an extremely complicated situation and the Board showed a lot of courage and resolve in standing up for the Hospital," observed Bacus. Bacus also noted that the Hospital Medical Staff and employees were extremely pleased and grateful for the overwhelming support shown by the community during the past two years.

Bacus commented that the end of the lawsuit marks a fresh start for Colorado-Fayette Medical Center and that he is very optimistic about the future of the Hospital in 1990. Bacus cited a number of reasons for his optimism including the following:

•The Hospital has been able to refinance its loan with Farmers Home Administration.

•The Hospital is fully paid-up with Medicare for fiscal years 1986, 1987, and 1988.

INFLUENZA: THE "FLU"

Influenza is an illness of the respiratory system (the breathing system; your lungs, nose and throat, etc.). The "flu," as it is commonly called, is caused by viruses of the influenza family, Orthomyxoviridae. The most common symptoms of the flu are a cough and a sore throat which begins abruptly. It may also be accompanied by fever, headache, muscle aches and pains, weakness and fatigue.

Symptoms of the flu can range from mild to severe. In uncomplicated cases, the "victim's" symptoms improve in 3-5 days, with most cases resolving in one week. It is not uncommon, however, for a patient to have symptoms of weakness (lassitude) persisting for several weeks after having had the flu.

Pneumonia can be a serious complication of influenza in some cases. Another serious, but rare complication is a disease called Reye's syndrome which occurs especially in children ages 2-16 who have been given aspirin. (As this complication can sometimes be fatal, it is recommended that children with symptoms of the flu be given an acetaminophen tablet (Tylenol, Panadol, Tempra, etc.) instead of an aspirin. If you improve in 24-48 hours, but then worsen, you may be developing complications of the flu; it is then advisable to see your doctor.

How can you protect yourself? Immunization offers protection to most-but-not-all people given the vaccine. You can't "get" the flu from the vaccine but up to 5% of individuals can experience symptoms such as fever and feeling "bad" for a day or so after vaccination.

People who are allergic or sensitive to eggs should not receive vaccine. The vaccine is currently recommended for those people who are prone to the more serious complications of influenza. This includes patients with diabetes mellitus, heart disease, chronic lung disease, kidney disease, asthma, AIDS, among others as well as residents in nursing homes and other chronic care facilities and their caretakers.

It is also recommended that healthy individuals over the age of 65 take precautions to protect themselves. Contact your physician for your personal vaccination needs and for more information on influenza and other diseases. The flu vaccine should be given in our area in November to offer the best protection of the flu season. Unfortunately, taking the vaccine last year or the year before offers no protection for the coming season.

It is not too late to take the vaccine but your body will need 2-4 weeks to develop a resistance to the vaccine. Though late, some protection can be seen before the flu season is over.

Eagle Lake Chamber of Commerce held its first monthly meeting of the year on January 15, 1990 at the Sportsman's Restaurant with President Rev. David Mann presiding.

2) Retail trade - Chairman, still pending (will include Shop Eagle Lake First project, Mall Mania and special items regarding retail trade).

3) Industrial-Agriculture Development - Chairman, Tom Reed, will work with city and county.

4) Historical - Chairman, Bill Harrison Sr. (will explore history we can use to help promote Eagle Lake).

5) Membership - Chairman, Kate Spalinger.

6) Public Relations - Chairman, Sandy Bendy (will be responsible for all publicity for Chamber, whether it is meetings, projects or special events).

7) Welcome Committee - all officers (will be in charge of ribbon cuttings, etc.).

8) Queen Comm. - Chairman, Linda Balas.

9) Civic Improvements - Chair-

man, Becky Anderson (will include housing, anything involved with streets and city; will coordinate with city government and county government).

10) Finance and Budget - Chairman, Heidi Mills.

11) Health - Chairman, Marcella Henke (will develop ways for Chamber to promote city health industry).

12) Tourism - Chairman, Jimmy Adkins (will work with current organization, Pioneer Trail, and possible new project; will include a representative from all festivals or events in Eagle Lake).

The 1990 budget was discussed. This will be presented to city council by February 1 for Hotel/Motel tax budget.

President Mann discussed plans for the year. He reported that he would like for Chamber not to totally rely on outside committees or people to take care of tourism and promotions of Eagle Lake that the Chamber should be responsible for. He said that all Chamber members need to know what is happening in town and surrounding areas and it needs to be reported to the Chamber office. He stated that we need to have the name of Eagle Lake Chamber of Commerce out to the public and for the public to know what the Chamber is doing.

Sandy Bendy reported that Revitalize Eagle Lake, Inc. would like to go together with the Chamber and Eagle Lake Industrial Foundation in either purchasing or leasing a tour wagon for the Wildflower Celebration that will be held in April. Discussion was held. Jimmy Adkins, as

Tourism Chairman, was asked to get more information on this matter before Chamber votes on this.

Mayor Roy Dean Van Nort reported that Eagle Lake has been awarded a \$170,000.00 grant from the Texas Aeronautical Commission to refurbish the city airport. This is to be completed by next hunting season. The runway will be widened from 50 ft. to 75 ft. and there will be a 200 ft. safety threshold built. The runway will be able to handle 12,000 pounds. The city council will have to pass an airport zoning. Mayor Van Nort also reported that the park grant and the prison project is still in process.

President Mann reported on Pioneer Trail events. The monthly Pioneer Trail meeting will be held on January 17 at Anna Lee's Kitchen at noon; the Chamber was invited to El Campo's Chamber of Commerce Banquet to be held January 18; Chamber was invited to Columbus F.F.A. parade March 10; Hallettsville Knights of Columbus Wild Game Dinner will be January 19. Tickets are \$5.00; Hallettsville Annual Dominoe Tournament, January 20; Rice High School F.F.A. Show will be on January 22, and tickets are being sold for lunch to be served from 11 a.m. to noon. The sale begins at noon. Call the Chamber office for further information on these events.
