The Richards' Gaffe

Hobby's Education Plan
Lame duck Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, remaining on stage as a voice of reason while the special session nears, said reforming school finance won't be enough to improve the state's educational product.

He disagreed with fellow lame duck Gov. Bill Clement's hard-line approach, which is to equalize funding with no new taxes to satisfy the

courts and leave major reform to the Legislature's regular session next January.

Right now, Hobby's Democrats control the Legislature; Clements and others are banking on a closer margin after the elections.

Among Hobby's proposals last week:

- Lengthening the school year;
- Tougher achievement tests;
- Better pay for teachers;
- Tax credits for businesses that support education; and
- Reward school systems with superior achievement records.

Other Highlights
-The Texas Secretary of State's office distributed voter registration cards in convenience stores in some cities. Absentee voting is from Feb. 21 to March 9; primaries are March 13.

-U.S. Rep. Pete Geren, D-Fort Worth, spent close to \$1 million to win his special election victory to replace former U.S. Rep. Jim Wright, according to the Federal Election Commission.

Anyone wishing to file for the positions of mayor or the two city council seats which are up for re-election in Eagle Lake may sign up beginning Monday, February 19 through March 21. Also, two school board seats are up for re-election in the Rice school district with sign up from February 20-March 21.

City candidates may sign up at the Eagle Lake City Hall and candidates for school board positions may sign up at the administration building on the Rice High School campus in Altair.

Absentee (early) voting will take place April 16 through May 1 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the city hall for the city election or from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the administration building on the Rice High School campus in Altair for the school board election.

City councilmen up for re-election are Vice Councilman, Emilio Sommerlaite and Mayor Roy D. Van Nott's seat also is up for re-election.

The school board positions currently being held by Frederick Leopold (Position 6) and Wayne Cornett (Position 7) will be up for re-election.

Air Force offers scholarships for nurses

"New nurse anesthetists will have the chance to work in the most up-to-date hospitals in the world," said Captain Norris. "These medical facilities range in size from 25 to 1,000 beds and have the latest technologies." Wilford Hall USAF Medical Center in San Antonio, is the largest. It's the only medical facility in the military which has a bone marrow transplant capability.

Texas Rice Producers Legislative Group receives check from Eagle Lake Rice Dryer

On Wednesday, February 7, Jacko Garrett, president of the Eagle Lake Rice Dryer Board of Directors, presented a check for \$4,782.21 to Steve Balas, president of the Texas Rice Producers Legislative Group.

The Board at Eagle Lake Rice Dryer agreed to contribute 1/2 cent per wet cwt. of rice dried at the facility to help support the efforts of the Texas Legislative Group. The total amount of wet rice crop received for the 1989 season at the dryer was 956,442.80 cwt.

Other Board of Directors on hand to witness the donation were J.T. Garrett, vice president; J.R. Thomas, secretary/treasurer; Nelson Isenhower, Clark Powers and Dan Gertson Jr.

Jacko Garrett said the Texas Rice Producers Legislative Group, formed in 1989, has proven to be a very effective voice for the Texas rice farmer in Washington last year. "It's the only voice we have in Legislation," remarked Garrett, "and we highly encourage all rice farmers in Texas to support this group."

Through the efforts of the Legislative group last year, ARP has held the 20% level rather than a much lower percent requested by the Rice Millers Association. "Texas rice farmers will help shape the 1990 Farm bill through the efforts made by the Texas Rice Producers Legislative Group and we all must show our support to such an important group," Garrett concluded.

Steve Balas has recently returned from a trip to Washington D.C. and plans to go to Washington next week as he continues to work for the rice farmers in Texas as chairman of the Texas Rice Producers Legislative Group.

Balas was elected chairman in January of 1989 and he will serve until 1993. As chairman of the group, Balas represents rice farmers in Washington and meets with key agricultural persons trying to help legislators see the issues and problems facing the farmers.

Balas has farmed rice in Eagle Lake for 17 years. He also is a registered pharmacist and owner of Eagle Lake Drugstore where he can be seen filling prescriptions when he is not lobbying for farmers in Washington.

Balas has been pleased with the results his trips to Washington have obtained and he says a legislative group is critical for farmers who are facing some serious financial problems.

"The legislators in Washington must be informed of the real issues in

Approximately 20% of all ophthalmologists use "Phacoemulsification" to remove Cataracts and of these only 3% use the one such "Small Incision" technique. Be sure to ask your doctor about "Phacoemulsification" and "Small Incision".
