ming pool ordinance after several complaints were voiced by residents about pools not being fenced, but those residents were not at the meeting Tuesday night to state their opinion on the ordinance. The ordinance will be discussed further at the next meeting. Public comment is encouraged.

In other matters, council:

- Approved the juvenile grant for the third year with Eagle Lake's share being \$2,815.50. The grant is currently four months into the second year and the Sheriff's office needs to reapply now for the third year.
- Approved the participation in state dangerous drug control unit grant or federal multi-agency crime control units grant, if chosen. The state grant is similar to the juvenile grant being a 5 year plan and beginning September 1, 1990. The federal grant is a one year program and would begin June 1, 1990.

Sheriff Bill Esterling and Chief of Police Lupe Villarreal both agreed they were very pleased with the juvenile officer position. Villarreal said Eagle Lake has come out on top with the juvenile grant.

• Approved, on an emergency basis, to have the post office roof replaced for \$4,850.

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lice arrested Elvin Pipkins for possession of cocaine. According to the police report, Pipkins was reportedly seen selling cocaine behind Stevenson's Cafe in Eagle Lake.

Sgt. Jones found Pipkins inside the cafe. A small match box containing three small pieces of white substance which appeared to be cocaine was found in Pipkins' left front pocket. Police also seized \$710.

Pipkins was transported to the Colorado County Jail and charged with possession of cocaine. Bond was set at \$10,000 by Judge Barry White. Sgt. Jones was assisted by Chief of Police Villarreal and Officer Grimes.

In other reports, on February 9 Eagle Lake police issued citations to Jerry Devin Van Nort, 19, of Eagle Lake, for speeding and fleeing from police officers and arrested him on a warrant issued by Harris County for violation of probation.

According to the report, Officer Michael Hines observed a 1988 black Ford Mustang, driven by Van Nort, speeding 84 in a 35 m.p.h. speed zone on South McCarty. Once Van Nort turned on Austin Road, he turned his lights off and eluded officers. Officer Grimes spotted the Mustang traveling east on Main Street, turning onto FM 3013. Grimes continued behind the vehicle until the county line on FM 3013 advising Austin County of the pursuit. Approximately 10 minutes later, Austin County Deputy Bubba Brzozowski stopped Van Nort four miles west on FM 3013.

Seaholm

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Seaholm graduated from Southwest Texas State University in 1951 with a BS degree in Chemistry. According to Boling High School Principal Pete Kucera, Seaholm is an asset to the school and is a favorite among the students too.

The Texas Excellence Awards for Outstanding High School Teachers, sponsored by the Ex-Students' Association and the College of Education of UT Austin, recognizes teachers who help prepare their students for higher education. It was established in 1986 in an effort to promote public esteem for the teaching profession in Texas.

The cash awards are funded through the Ex-Students' Association's Foundation for Texas Excellence, the vehicle for Texas Exes to contribute directly to the association's programs of academic support for the university.

Nineteen indicted by Grand Jury

The Colorado County Grand Jury returned 19 indictments Monday, February 15 including an attempted murder, a sexual assault of a child, and five charges of possession of cocaine.

Joe Dean Dickerson was indicted for attempted murder and aggravated assault. Count 1: on September 23, 1989, he assaulted, with intent to murder, Brent Edward Wainner in the Boot Hill Bar and Grill in Columbus by cutting with a knife. Count 2, same date, same victim, Dickerson did cause bodily injury by cutting Wainner with a knife.

Jackie Tezeno was indicted for sexual assault on a child under 17 years. On December 28, 1989, Tezeno was arrested after a minor was admitted to the Columbus Community Hospital following a sexual attack. He was identified by the victim as her attacker. The jury was advised of three previous convictions against Tezeno: on September 5, 1988, in Harris County, burglary of a habitation with intent to commit theft; on November 8, 1983, in Harris County, burglary of a motor vehicle, and September 27, 1978, in Harris County, burglary of a motor vehicle.

The five cocaine charges were returned as follows:

• Larry Wayne Ashton, possession of a controlled substance (cocaine), less than 28 grams, on November 17, 1989.

• Gary Lloyd Cruise, possession of a controlled substance (cocaine), less than 28 grams, on December 15, 1989.

• Rodney Carter, possession of a controlled substance (cocaine), less than 28 grams, on December 2, 1989.

• Reginald Evans, possession of a controlled substance (cocaine), less than 28 grams, on December 2, 1989.

• Stanley Marcel Scott, possession of a controlled substance (cocaine), less than 28 grams, on September 7, 1989.

Other indictments were:

• Milton Jerome Doublin, burglary of the Herbert Lockier building (Western Auto in Eagle Lake) on December 14, 1989. The jury was informed of two previous convictions: on October 24, 1986, in Harris County, for delivery of a controlled substance (cocaine), less than 28 grams, and October 28, 1982, in Harris County, delivery of a controlled substance (cocaine), less than 28 grams.

• Jonnie Louis Reznick, burglary of a habitation in Chesterville on December 26, 1989.

• Kevin Scott Hoot, burglary of a habitation in Chesterville on December 26, 1989, and burglary of the Tenneco plant near Chesterville around December 1, 1989.

• Clarence George Brazda Jr., burglary of a habitation in Chesterville on December 26, 1989, and burglary of the Tenneco plant near Chesterville around December 1, 1989.

• Patrick Allen Richeson, burglary of Ernie Grimes' residence in Eagle Lake on January 5, 1990.

forming 2 or more years below grade level.

• Spanish III.

• Manufacturing Graphics which is a new title with addition of content to the present drafting class so that it will qualify for vocational funds.

• Auto Mechanics will become a 2 hour block instead of 3 with general repairs being added to its content.

• Advanced Research and Technological Writing Course for tenth and eleventh graders, and a

• Basic Vocational Education Course for students 14 or older who qualify for special education and who score a 25 or less percentile in math and Language. The course will focus on good study habits, self-esteem, consumer management, vocational occupation and career awareness, and general homemaking.

McGaughy also presented to the board on Honors Program Implementation Plan and the recommendation that Rice High School move to a 4.0 grading scale instead of the present 3.0, which does not coincide with college grading and most other school districts. It was the general consensus of the board that it approved and McGaughy will continue with plans to implement the two recommendations beginning with the Freshmen class of 1992.

With the implementation of an Honors Program, which would gradually phase out the present premium classes, Rice High School graduates taking 5 or more honors classes would be eligible to receive an Advanced

Honors Seal upon graduation. The present premium courses are not recognized by the state or colleges and universities as honor courses.

McGaughy also reported to the board on status of plans for instruction through TI-IN, which is united distance learning by satellite. The program brings outstanding academic resources directly to the classroom via satellite.

Mark Clapp, a representative of the San Antonio based company told the board that their program has been in place 4 1/2 years and is coordinated by the Region 20 Service Center. It is the first time a private company and a public company have joined together to provide public education. The program is in 29 states, 1,000 school districts and serves 1,300 students taking

21 academic courses. The program allows students to receive credits for subjects not offered in their local high school, such as German, Japanese, Russian, Latin, calculus, etc. The satellite program can also be used for teacher training, parent training, student test review, and school board training. The board will make a decision on the TI-IN satellite program for Rice High School at its April meeting.

If approved the program would be implemented with the 1990-91 school year.

John Matthews reported to the board on bond election activities. The board has made presentations to all faculty and staff and many service organizations. Matthews stated, "the general response to the bond election has been positive."

The request to sell 1,546 square feet of county land to the Koliba estate was approved by commissioners for a total of \$1,263.70.

• Appointed Dr. Raymond Thomas as health officer.

• Confirmed Rev. Raymond W. Cox, pastor of First Baptist Church of Columbus, replacing Rev. Al Flathmann on the Children's Protective Service Board.

• Read a notification by Texas Health Department of acceptance of the Waste Water Disposal Program (septic tank facilities).

• Discussed listing county telephones in the four county directories. The cost of the listings per year would be \$2,070 and commissioners agreed that was too high. Commissioner Sonny Spaniel suggested asking if a can be obtained as a public service.

• Reported four scalps taken by a special trapper with 24 by regular taking.

• Reported the Columbus ambulance had 47 runs for the month of January. Eagle Lake had 45 and Weimar had 38.
