On March 2, at 10 a.m., Rice High School viewed the anti-drug play "Addict". The play was put on by students from La Grange under the direction of Becky Parker. Thirty-eight high school and middle school students were involved in the production. They rehearsed two nights a week at different locations in La Grange, and were also expected to work on their parts on their own time.

Jerome McDonough, a high school teacher in Amarillo, and publisher of the play, said "This play is neither self-consciously 'preachy' nor offensively didactic. It presents the facts and they speak for themselves. The play is riveting. I would recommend its performance in every high school in the nation. A live program such as this is probably the most effective way to present the dangers of drugs to our vulnerable youth, and this excellent script does so without preaching or pretense of any kind."

The play deals with the disease of addiction and is designed to help drug and alcohol addicts to seek help. During the performance of the play in each community, places for addicts to receive help were mentioned, and counselors were there for abusers to talk to after the performances.

In addition to the play being performed at Rice High School, "Addict" was also presented at the Eagle Lake Middle School Campus on March 2, at 2 p.m.
