"Using dBASE IV", a 2-day seminar, will be taught March 29 and 30 through the University of Houston-Victoria continuing education program.

Blue star tattoos laced with LSD

The following information came to our attention: A form of tattoo called the "Blue Star" is being sold to school children. It is a small sheet of paper containing blue stars the size of a pencil eraser. Each star is soaked with LSD. Each star can be removed and placed in the mouth. The LSD can be absorbed through the skin simply by handling the paper.

There are also brightly colored paper tabs resembling postage stamps that have pictures of Superman, butterflies, clowns, Mickey Mouse and other Disney characters on them. These stamps are packed in a red cardboard box wrapped in foil. This is a new way of selling acid by appealing to young children.

A young child could happen upon these and have a fatal "trip". It is also learned that little children could be given a free tattoo by other children who want to have some fun or by others cultivating new customers (without the child's knowledge).

A stamp called "Red Pyramid" is also being distributed along with "Microdots" in various colors and another kind of "Window Pane" which has a grid that can be cut out. These are laced with drugs!

Commander Wilfred Lueddecke and President Shirley Lueddecke of the VFW Post 8783 and Lady Auxiliary advises all parents to inform their children about these drugs. Teachers and principals should also be aware of these dangerous stamps. If you or your child get any of the above Do Not Handle Them Bars-handled! Contact your local Police Department. These are known to react very quickly and some are laced with strychnine.

Symptoms: Hallucinations, severe vomiting, uncontrolled laughter, mood changes and change in body temperature.

P.M. Heat subject of TV special in Shiner area

A day in the musical life of local dancehall favorites P.M. Heat will form the heart of an upcoming Austin television documentary.

Austin NBC affiliate KXAN-TV were in the Shiner area March 2-4 shooting footage for a story focusing on the emergence of P.M. Heat as the region's top live music phenomenon. The two-part report will be broadcast in mid-March to coincide with P.M. Heat's March 16 showcase concert at the Driskill Hotel during the South by Southwest Music and Media Convention in Austin.

The KXAN crew, headed by award-winning video producer Jim Swift, will spend three days around Shiner filming slices of local life and color. "They were shooting at our dance March 2 from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. at the American Legion Hall in Shiner," says P.M. Heat manager Mark Hybner, "and they'll be filming the big polka dance at the hall on March 4 from 2-8 p.m. featuring two of the best polka bands in the area. The Central Texas Sounds and The New Edition."

The crew will also film activities at Shiner's Spoetzl Brewery and other notable business and tourism enterprises, says Hybner.

The main thrust of the documentary, however, will center on P.M. Heat's preparations for the prestigious South by Southwest convention. In an effort to impress visiting record company executives, the band is staging a special showcase at the historic Driskill Hotel in the heart of Austin's Sixth Street entertainment district that will include two performances at 9 and 11 p.m. on Friday, March 16. Free tickets are being distributed for the show, and several charter buses will be running to the hotel from Shiner, Flatonia, Hallettsville and other towns.

"This showcase will be an event like Austin has never seen," says Hybner. "We've got a lot of great new material ready and we really hope our fans can come support us."

Sheriff's Department investigates burglaries

The Colorado County Sheriff's Department is investigating several thefts and burglaries which recently occurred.

On February 19, Dr. Wayne A. Wolf of Sypress reported a burglary of a habitation to Deputy Brent Hoskins. According to the report, entry was gained through a bedroom window on the south side of the house.

One ceiling fan was taken and the blade off another fan was broken. Dr. Wolf advised Deputy Hoskins it has been about two weeks since he had been at the residence.

At 2:30 a.m. on February 22, Katherine Milton of Garwood advised Deputy Carol Wied someone had broken into her car and stole her purse. According to the report, Milton said someone broke out the window on the driver's side of the car and stole her chainsaw, a 24" Stihl in an orange case, missing.

At 6:23 a.m. March 3, David Pilsner of Alamyton advised Deputy Andrew Weido someone had broken into his business, Pilsner's Place, on Hwy. 90. Pilsner advised someone removed change from four coin-operated machines and miscellaneous change from a one gallon jar.

According to the report, entry was gained through a rear window located on the northwest side of the business. Upon entry, subject(s) pryed open four coin-operated machines and removed the approximate amount of money taken was as follows: \$60 from one pool table and \$25 from another for a total of \$85; \$10 from a video game, Ms. Pac-Man, and \$20 from a juke box.

The subject(s) then removed the pins from the hinges off a door gaining entry to the bar area of the business where they pryed open the cash register and removed the money tray. Pilsner advised he left no money in the cash register. The subject(s) then entered the kitchen and removed approximately \$10 in change from a one gallon jar. No other items were reported missing. According to the tracks, Deputy Weido concluded a small vehicle entered the parking lot from the west and exited the parking lot to the east.

Unauthorized releases hurt turkey program

The unauthorized release of pen-raised turkeys in two East Texas counties has caused state wildlife officials to cancel plans to release wild eastern turkeys in those areas next year.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said they discovered that pen-raised birds were released along Big Cypress Bayou and Boggy Creek in Morris County and around Ferndale Lake in Camp County.

"Releases of this kind are harmful to eastern turkey restoration efforts in addition to being illegal," said biologist Dr. Joe Camp of Marshall, eastern turkey species leader. Camp said the pen-raised birds tend to reduce the inherent wildness in wild turkeys, and they also can introduce diseases into wild populations. "Pen-raised birds can genetically pollute wild populations by interbreeding, causing the offspring to be less able to survive and reproduce in the wild."

Wild eastern turkeys historically occupied most of East Texas, but were virtually eliminated by 1900 due to market hunting and loss of habitat. Early efforts to stock pen-raised and non-native turkeys in the region failed to establish a single population, Camp said.

The department has stocked 65 areas in 23 East Texas counties since 1979, with most of the birds being trapped from the wild in other states. The current estimated eastern turkey population in East Texas is about 3,000 birds.
