Houston Commercial Steer Show

It all started on September 30, 1989 when Kim Corman, Sher Sunderman, Chad Sunderman, Whitey Dopslauf and Louis Mahalic weighed in each of their three commercial steers. They kept their steers on feed for 145 days, and on February 27, 1990, their steers were officially weighed in for the sale weight at the 1990 Houston Commercial Steer Show.

On February 27, the students studied together to prepare themselves for their written exam and oral interview. However, the exam and interview are only 50% of the judging process. Ten percent is the grade of the steer, which can be prime, choice or select. Another 10% is the cost per pound of gain, and 20% is in the accuracy of their records. Five percent is the conversion rate (pounds of feed per pound of gain) and another 5% is the average daily gain.

On Wednesday, February 28, the students' steers were graded by two livestock industry graders and one animal scientist from Texas A&M University. After grading, the students took their written exam followed by their preliminary interviews. The list of the twelve finalists was posted later that day, and Kim Corman, Sher Sunderman, and Louis Mahalic were among the twelve.

The Commercial Steer Auction was held on March 1, with the twelve finalists selling first. Sher sold first in the final sale and averaged \$75.33 per hundred weight (wt); Louis sold third and averaged \$76.17 per wt.; Kim sold ninth and averaged \$75.33 per wt.; Whitey sold 49th and averaged \$74.67 per wt.; and Chad sold 50th and averaged \$74.33 per wt.

Joshua Grahmann and Todd Mascheck went to Houston also, but they each took a heifer. Joshua placed first in the Simbra Heifer class and Todd received second place out of nine heifers in the Red Angus Heifer class.

Congratulations to all of these participants in the 1990 Houston Livestock Show.
