April 1 is the deadline for nominations from the public for the annual Lower Colorado River Authority Environmental Awards.

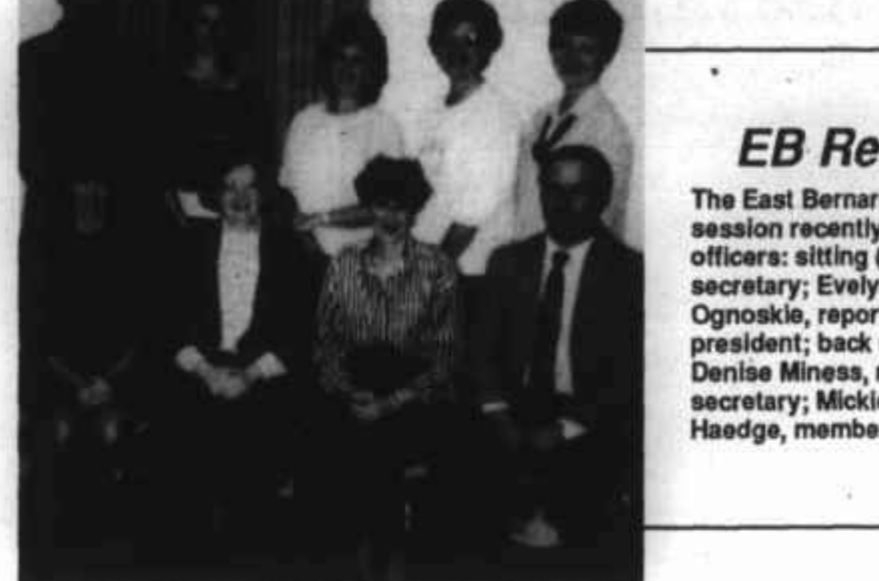
The program honors individuals, government entities, clubs, and businesses who accomplish outstanding improvements in environmental conditions, either in their local areas or statewide. Awards will be presented in May.

"LCRA wants to encourage local participation in environmental programs," said Mark Rose, LCRA's Deputy General Manager. "We're seeing people who previously were not active in this type of effort becoming more involved as environmental problems reach farther into our lives. People are working in recycling pro-

grams, in new ways to handle landfill problems, in cleaning up the waterways in their areas. Leaders in such projects should receive recognition, and that's what our awards are all about."

The basic qualifications for a nominee are that the project be concerned with air, soil, or water quality and must have been completed in 1989. The project must be located in the LCRA electric service area and should stand as a model for other cities or groups facing the same problem.

During and after the war between the states, many U.S. citizens were uneasy about how the south would be governed. Thousands of concerned people crossed the Rio Grande, and sailed and settled along the Texan River on the Gulf between Tampico and Vera Cruz in Mexico.

These towns had been the main source of food and supplies sent into Texas during the war. Matamoros was the main point of entry into Mexico. At this time Maximilian ruled Mexico and was friendly to the U.S. citizens. There was a thriving American colony along the river including some canning factories. Many military figures and business men were among the colonists, Alan Terrel, Joe Shelly, John Montgomery and Asa Townsend - to name a few. One writer printed a "Immigrants Guide" and wrote many articles for the Galveston News.

After the fall of Maximilian and around 1870, many Americans came back home. Alfred Gray Andrews; an ancestor of Miss Seaholm, was among the Texans who went and returned from Mexico. She showed the members a beautifully carved cypress walking cane that had been brought from Mexico that had belonged to Mr. Andrews.

Five public information meetings are scheduled to offer more information about the watermaster program.

Congress Avenue, Austin; Thursday, March 29: 1 p.m., Wharton County Courthouse, District Courtroom, 2nd Floor, Wharton; Monday, April 2: 1 p.m., Texas A&M University Research Center Auditorium, 7887 N. Highway 87, San Angelo; Tuesday, April 3: 1 p.m., Brownwood Comfort Inn, Camp Bowie Meeting Room, 410 E. Commerce, Brownwood; Wednesday, April 4: 1 p.m., Fredericksburg Comfort Inn, 2nd Floor, 908 S. Adams, Fredericksburg.

The goal of the watermaster program is to provide improved management and protection of water rights in the area. This will be accomplished by monitoring water use from streams and on-channel reservoirs throughout the designated area on a day-to-day basis, resulting in a more equitable distribution of water.

In accordance with watermaster rules, each owner of a water right within the watermaster area will receive an annual assessment bill to finance the watermaster program. The assessment per water right will depend on the type of use and the amount of water authorized by the water right.

The first assessment bill is expected to be mailed in September, with payment to be due in November, 1990.
