4-H shooting sports project going strong

 Many Colorado County 4-Hers are involved in one of the fastest growing projects in the state of Texas. This is the 4-H Shooting Sports project.

4-H is the youth development program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The mission of 4-H is to provide youth and adults with the opportunity to acquire knowledge, develop skills and form attitudes which enable them to become self-directing, productive and contributing members of society.

The purpose of the 4-H shooting sports program is to involve youth in a developmental program which teaches shooting skills and safety while developing leadership and citizenship. It also provides a vehicle for positive involvement and promotes family relationships with peers and adults.

In this project, 4-H members learn safety and skills for shooting a .22 rifle and for archery. The youth are able to compete locally for patches and participate in shooting matches throughout the state.

Currently, 25 4-H members are involved in the rifle aspect of the shooting sports program. They have attended safety classes, and are now learning shooting skills and safety at the National Guard Armory shooting range.

To help support this project, the 4-H Shooting Sports Project Group will be selling chances for some excellent prizes which have been donated by businesses throughout the county. These may be purchased from a 4-H member in the project or by calling the County Extension Office at 732-2530.

Active Parenting is an innovative video-based and group discussion program designed to enhance child-parent relationships. During the six-week period, methods for the development of mutual respect, cooperation and self-esteem of all family members are offered and practiced.

The classes will cost \$10 per person, or \$15 per couple. This will cover the cost of support materials.

Dr. Brian R. Tulloch to speak at Diabetes Support Group meeting

The next meeting of the Colorado County Diabetes Support Group will be on Tuesday, April 17, 1990 at 6:30 p.m. at the Sportsman's Catering Center, in Eagle Lake. Hors d'oeuvres will be served at 6:30 p.m. and the program will begin at 7 p.m. This will also be the annual meeting of the Colorado County Branch of the Harris County Chapter of the American Diabetes Association.

The speaker for this meeting will be Dr. Brian R. Tulloch, M.D. of Houston, Texas.

Dr. Tulloch's topic will be "The Neurological Effects of Diabetes Mellitus".

Dr. Tulloch came to Houston in 1977 and is currently endocrinologist at the Diagnostic Clinic. He is a Clinical Associate Professor of Medicine and Ophthalmology at the University of Texas Medical School and M.D. Anderson Hospital in Houston. Dr. Tulloch is a member of the Royal College of Surgeons, Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians, London, and the American College of Physicians. He is a past President of the Texas Affiliate of the American Diabetes Association, Treasurer of the Houston Pituitary Society and has served as Fleet Surgeon in the Houston Yacht Club.

Dr. Tulloch is the author or co-author of approximately 80 articles and abstracts based upon his investigations in diabetes, endocrinology, and metabolism. His research interests concern the epidemiology of diabetes, the management of its ocular complications, and hormonal control of lipid metabolism. He is also manuscript reviewer for many journals including *Diabetologia*, *Hormone and Metabolism*, *Research*, *Clinical Science*, *Cardiovascular Research*, *Biochemical Pharmacology*, and the *Journal of Clinical Investigation*.

Dr. Youens speaks to Diabetes Support Group

Dr. Robert Youens spoke to the Colorado County Diabetes Support Group on Tuesday, February 20, 1990. The topic was "The Relationship of Diabetes and the Flu". Dr. Youens told those present that although a person with Diabetes will not get the flu easier, if he does contract it, the person with Diabetes will most likely become more ill than one who does not have Diabetes. This is because a person's body already has a condition he has to compensate for when he has Diabetes.

Dr. Youens also told the group that the flu vaccine does not protect a person from every strain of virus that cause the illness. However, if a person with Diabetes gets his annual flu vaccine he is better protected than the person who does not.

Dr. Youens also stated that Diabetes should seriously consider obtaining this informal and enlightening contact with Dr. Youens at Colorado-Fayette Medical Center.
