




Garwood School pre-kindergarten, kindergarten registration scheduled The Garwood School will hold their registration for Pre-kindergarten and kindergarten students on Monday, April 30, 1990 from 9 to 10 a.m. at the Garwood School Office.

To be eligible for kindergarten a child must be five years old on or before September 1, 1990. A birth certificate and health records are needed to register. It will not be necessary for a pupil currently enrolled in pre-kindergarten to register for kindergarten next year. To be eligible for pre-kindergarten a child must be four years old on or before September 1, 1990. A child must be unable to speak and comprehend the English language or be from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, are at or below subsistence level.

The required immunizations are DPT, Polio, and MMR (rubella, mumps, and measles). A DPT/Polio booster after the child's fourth birthday is also required before admission to school.

Primary School supply list 1990-91 The Eagle Lake Primary School announces the following list of school supplies needed for grades Early Childhood through second grade upon the opening of the 1990-91 school term.

Early Childhood: One pair blunt scissors, one large box tissues, two boxes of small crayons (8 colors), 4 oz. bottle of school glue, one change of clothing, thin or thick pencils (2), book satchel or tote bag.
