Rice school board open bids for asbestos removal

A LYNDIA APPELT By a special meeting of the Rice CISD Board of Trustees was held Monday night in the library at the Eagle Lake Middle School.

The board passed a resolution authorizing the issuance of asbestos abatement and environmental clean up notes in the amount of \$280,000, payable in ten years, with an approximate yearly principal and interest payment of \$45,000. The payment will be payable on April 1 of each year.

The board then approved the advertisement and acceptance of bids for asbestos removal. Since bids might be received before funds become available, the bids will be contingent upon receipt of funds. Bids will be received until 2 p.m. on May 11.

The final action on Monday night's agenda was the adoption of a resolution granting a 20% homestead exemption for 1990. This is the maximum amount the board can grant. Action on homestead exemption must be acted upon every year.

Several asbestos removal projects must be completed before renovation at the Eagle Lake Middle School provided for in the recent bond election can begin.

The board then approved the advertisement and acceptance of bids for asbestos removal. Since bids might be received before funds become available, the bids will be contingent upon receipt of funds. Bids will be received until 2 p.m. on May 11.

Several deer hunt changes proposed

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Wildlife Division has proposed several changes in white-tailed deer hunting regulations for 1990-91, including reductions in bag limits in several counties and prohibition of hunting deer with dogs.

The proposed changes will be aired in public hearings across the state during April, and the Parks and Wildlife Commission will consider them for adoption on May 24.

Changes adopted at that time will go into effect Sept. 1, 1990.

The proposed white-tailed deer season for most of the state is Nov. 3, 1990, through Jan. 6, 1991. The South Texas season is proposed for Nov. 10, 1990, through Jan. 13, 1991. The proposed mule deer season for the Panhandle is Nov. 17-Dec. 2, and in the Trans-Pecos it is Nov. 24-Dec. 9.

Bobby Alexander, acting director of the Wildlife Division, told the commission the staff recommended that the use of dogs to hunt deer be prohibited statewide. The practice was allowed in 10 East Texas counties during the last half of the 1989-90 deer hunting season.

Another change proposed was establishment of "doe days," or days within the hunting season designated for the taking of antlerless deer, in certain counties.

Dove and teal seasons proposed

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has tentatively proposed 1990-91 early-season migratory game bird hunting regulations that are similar to last year. However, officials said the September teal season and the special white-winged dove season are still in doubt.

The early-season proposals were presented along with other proposed hunting and fishing regulation changes to the Parks and Wildlife commission on March 22. The proposals were aired in public hearings across the state during April, then considered for adoption by the commission in a public hearing in Austin on May 24.

Ron George, dove program leader, said the nine-day September teal season, which traditionally began in Texas on the third Saturday in September, was closed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) nationwide in both 1988 and 1989. This was a response to concerns about poor production resulting from extended drought on the northern breeding grounds, George said. "Although it's too early in the season to determine teal nesting success, water conditions in the nesting areas don't appear to have improved significantly," he said.

George said the department is proposing to allow hunters the traditional two-weekend special white-winged dove season in the Special White-winged Dove Area along the Rio Grande. However, the proposed September 1-2 and 8-9 season also is subject to FWS approval. Like teal, white-winged nesting success has been below normal in recent years because of the weather. Freezing temperatures last winter severely damaged citrus trees in the Valley, adversely affecting as much as half the region's white-winged nesting habitat, George said.

Another proposed change in dove regulations would lengthen the winter mourning dove season in the Central

and South Zones from 10 to 16 days in order to provide three full weekends of hunting. George said surveys indicate that much of the dove hunting activity in Texas occurs in the first two weeks of the fall season and declines steadily after that time. Activity increases with the opening of the January season, he said. The fall hunting season would be closed six days earlier, and those days would be applied to the January season, George said.

The mourning dove season proposed for 1990-91 is: North Zone, Sept. 1-Nov. 9; Central Zone, Sept. 1-Oct. 24 and Jan. 5-20; South Zone, Sept. 20-Nov. 12 (Nov. 8 in the Special White-winged Dove Area) and Jan. 5-20.

The proposed mourning dove bag limit for all three zones is 12 mourning, white-winged and white-tipped doves in the aggregate, including no more than two white-winged and two white-tipped doves per day; the possession limit is twice the daily bag limit. Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset in all zones.

The white-winged dove season in the Special White-winged Dove Area (except Sanctuary A), is proposed for Sept. 1-2 and 8-9, and shooting hours are noon to sunset. For the portion of the white-winged zone south and east of Del Rio the proposed bag limit during the white-wing season is 10 white-winged, mourning and white-tipped doves in the aggregate including no more than five mourning doves and two white-tipped doves per day. For the portion of the zone north and west of Del Rio the proposed limit is 10 white-winged, mourning and white-tipped doves in the aggregate including no more than two white-tipped doves per day. The possession limit is twice the daily bag limit.

The staff also proposed to continue the requirement that one fully-feathered wing remain on all dressed

NOTICE OF MAINTENANCE TAX ELECTION

An election shall be held in COLORADO COUNTY WATER CONTROL AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 2 in accordance with the following Order:

ORDER CALLING MAINTENANCE TAX ELECTION

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors desire to call a maintenance tax election, now therefore;

BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF COLORADO COUNTY WATER CONTROL AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 2:

Section 1. That an election be held on the 5th day of May, 1990 at the Lions Club Hall, Garwood, Texas for the purpose of submitting the following proposition:

PROPOSITION

"Shall the Board of Directors of Colorado County Water Control and Improvement District No. 2 be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed \$0.15 per \$100 of assessed valuation for maintenance purposes, including funds for planning, maintaining, repairing, and operating all necessary plants, properties, facilities, and improvements of the District and for paying cost of proper services, engineering and legal fees, and organization and administrative expenses?"

Section 3. On the day of the election, the polls shall be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Section 4. Absentee voting shall be at the District Office, Garwood, Texas (Building Address: P.O. Box 317, Garwood, Texas 77442) from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., commencing April 15, 1990 and continuing through May 1, 1990 on each day which is not a Saturday, Sunday, or official State holiday.

Section 5. Paper ballots shall be used for said election and shall be prepared so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid Proposition which shall appear on the ballot substantially as follows:

"THE MAINTENANCE TAX AS SUBMITTED IN THE PROPOSITION"

Section 6. All resident qualified electors of the District shall be permitted to vote at said election. This election shall be held and conducted in accordance with the Texas Election Code, except as modified by the provisions of Chapter 51 of the Texas Water Code, and as may be required by law. All election materials and proceedings shall be printed in both English and Spanish.
