break an ankle than sprain it. A sprain is a severe stretching or tearing of a ligament, and

ligaments take a very long time to heal. Behind every reoccurring sprain is a history of improp-erly healed initial injury. A mild sprain stretches the ligament but doesn't tear it. A moderate sprain

involves a partial tear, and a severe sprain completely tears one or more ligaments. The mild

sprain is the only one that doesn't require a cast. A walking cast must be worn for a full six

weeks. Any less time is too little for full healing. After the cast is removed, the ankle should

Dacryocystitis, a common infection of the tear-collecting (lacrimal) sac, usually occurs in infants or people over age 40. The source of the infant's problem is usually a developmental failure in one of the tear ducts (nasolacrimal ducts) that drain into the nose.
