## Rice G/T forms mentorship bank

The Gifted and Talented Independent Study Seminar class at Rice High School has enjoyed a great deal of community support in terms of the formation of a mentorship bank. Five individuals, headed by Mrs. Margo Harrison, met with Joe Wendel, G/T instructor at Rice High School, and decided that one of the most valuable resources for primary research in many areas is located within the Rice School District — namely patrons who, because of their job or hobby and their interest in the education process, would be willing to serve as mentors to the G/T students. Other committee members, Mrs. Martha Polach of Sheridan, Mrs. Veronica (Salinas) Villafuerte (Class of '80), Mrs. Robin (Engstrom) Thomas (Class of '73), and Mr. Robby Cook (Class of '80), along with Mrs. Harrison, spent many hours making lists of individuals along with pertinent information such as address, phone number, area of expertise, and even cross-referencing of data for use by the students.

The committee then delivered their findings which are presently being entered into a computer random-access file program.
