Another edition to the U.I.L. contest that will be held on March 22, at Blinn College is Literary Criticism. The nature of the contest is divided into four parts. The first part will require knowledge of literary history and critical terms. Part two, the ability in Literary Criticism, will test the contestants over material on the reading list and require the contestants to select the fewest answers involving judgement in literary criticism. The third part will test the contestant over short literary passages not previously reviewed, and the contestant must be able to select the best answers involving judgement for each given passage. Part four is a tie breaker in which the contestant will be required to write a short essay about a short literary passage presented to them. The reading list for this year's Literary Criticism will consist of a novel "All the Kings Men" by Robert Penn, a drama "A Doll's House" by Henrik Ibsen and poetry of ten selections by Robert Browning. Those contestants who have entered into this event and meet all of the above requirements are Heather Abel and Nobel Anderson (pictured above). This event will consist of three district high school winners who will qualify for regional meets and three regional winners for the State Meet.

'Recycle for Education'
Used aluminum beverage cans donated by thousands of thirsty Texans created 10 college scholarships for high school seniors in a recently completed four-month statewide recycling program called RECYCLE FOR EDUCATION. Thanks to Texas's generosity, the Texas Coca-Cola Bottlers Association, and other sponsors, \$100,000 will be donated to the University Interscholastic League scholarship program. Other sponsors include Schlitz's, Browning Feris Industries, Western Auto, and Alcoa Recycling Company, Inc. The U.I.L. is the governing body for academic, fine arts and athletic competition in Texas public schools. "Texas seniors weren't the only winners," said Maria Keeler, District manager for Alcoa Recycling Company. "Everyone wins and nobody loses when we recycle. Recycling aluminum saves energy, fights litter and extends the lives of municipal landfills. In 1990, more than 61 percent of all the aluminum cans produced nationally were recycled, and we believe that figure was even higher in Texas. Programs like RECYCLE FOR EDUCATION enhance our children's understanding of environmental problems and encourage them to seek out solutions." Keeler said three public schools were selected to receive cash awards for outstanding participation in the recycling campaign. The Texas Coca-Cola Bottlers Association awarded \$1,000 a piece to Westlawn Elementary in La Marque and Travis Heights Elementary in Austin. In addition, the U.I.L. awarded a separate \$1,000 scholarship to West Mesquite High School in Mesquite.

A DRY EYE IN THE HOUSE
The tears that bathe and protect the eye consist of layers of oil, water, and mucus. Not only do tears keep the eye clean and moist, they also provide virtually all the oxygen that nourishes the cornea. It is a cause for concern, therefore, when a person develops the condition known as "dry eye." The ophthalmologist may prescribe any one of a number of artificial tear products in an effort to stop the dryness, itching, gritty feeling, pain, light sensitivity and redness that accompany this condition. Occasionally soft contact lenses may be used to prevent evaporation of natural and artificial tears. In more severe cases, which do not respond to medical treatment, the eye's normal "drainage system" can be closed off by a simple surgical procedure in order to keep natural or artificial tears present in the eye for longer periods of time. Dry eyes are occasionally a side effect of certain medications. If you develop this condition, be sure to tell your ophthalmologist what drugs you may be taking.
