GAP

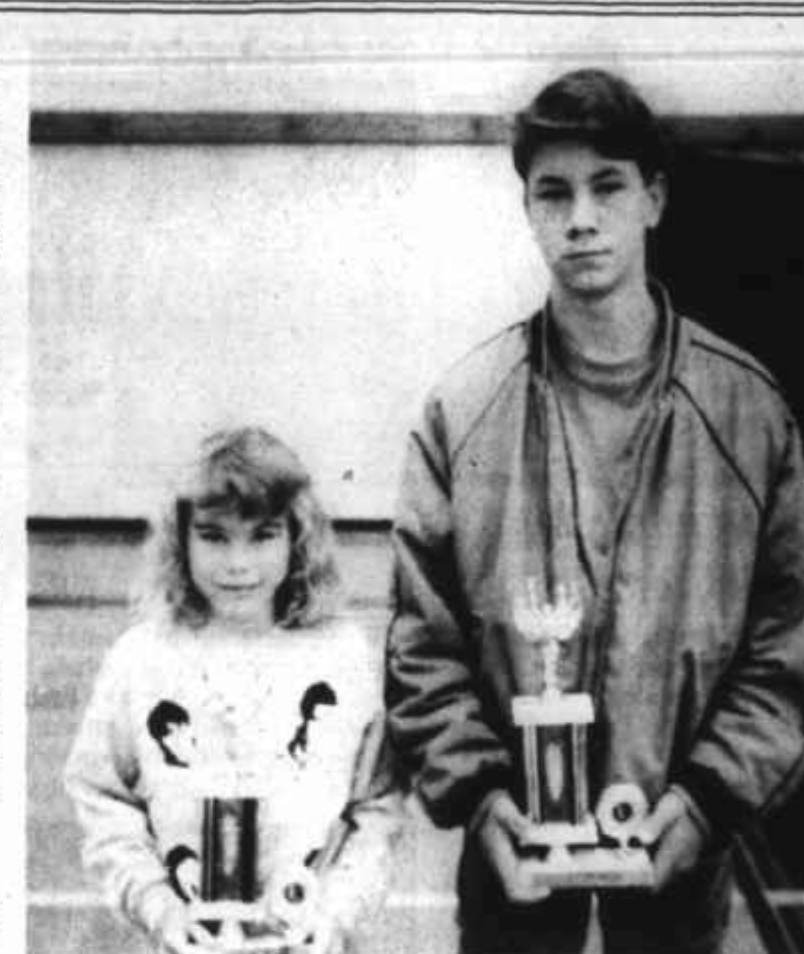

CPR training course scheduled for March 9

One of the most startling ideas of modern medicine is that "sudden death" can be reversed. This miracle of science may be brought about by any of us anywhere, using only our hands, our lungs, and our brains. Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) that is performed properly and promptly, before "sudden death" has resulted in final biological death, can give victims the time to receive treatment by advanced medical techniques. CPR has brought us from what has been practically the worst to now nearly the best survival rate in the world for victims of "sudden death" and cardiac arrest in the community.

A very special CPR Mass Training Event is planned for March 9. The training is co-sponsored by the Wharton Emergency Medical Services Department and Gulf Coast Medical Center. Adult, one-man CPR and obstructed airway will be taught to anyone age 12 and up. Classes will be held on the hour starting at 8 a.m. through 1 p.m. It will take approximately 3-1/2-4 hours for participants to complete the course which includes lecture, a written test and actual demonstration and testing on a CPR training mannequin.

There is a \$10 registration fee which must be paid in advance. The

\$10 fee is charged to offset the cost of materials. In fact, the CPR course is offered at a special discount rate since routine charge for this type of course has gone up to \$15 per participant. This fee may be paid when participants pick up their home study booklets which is a requirement of the course. Registration and arrangements to pick up the home study booklet may be done by calling Gulf Coast Medical Center's Physician Referral and Class Registration number, 532-8700 or 1-800-468-2469 between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

According to Gary Bonewald,

Wharton EMS Paramedic, President of the Wharton County American Heart Association and Affiliate Faculty Representative for Wharton County Basic Life Support, "The goal of this CPR Mass Training Event is community outreach. Our goal is to certify 300-400 people in adult, one-man CPR. We have discussed doing this for some time now but this is the first year that we have had adequate resources available to conduct a mass training which includes instructors and a proper facility to conduct this type of event. Instructors from numerous agencies are donating their time.

Loessin serving on H-GAC Board of Directors

County Commissioner Otto Loessin has been named Colorado County's representative on the Board of Directors of the Houston-Galveston Area Council (H-GAC). Designated by Commissioners Court, Loessin was formally installed at the recent H-GAC Annual Meeting. His alternate and fellow member of the General Assembly is Commissioner Jerome Wickes.

Long active on behalf of the county in H-GAC's many programs of planning and technical assistance to the region's local governments, he has been a member of the General Assembly for the last several years, and during that time, has served as an alternate on the Board of Directors. Loessin joins 31 other local officials currently serving of H-GAC's policymaking body which meets monthly. H-GAC's work encompasses a wide program of planning in such region-wide matters as air and water quality, 911 emergency telephone communications, law enforcement-officers training, job training and re-employment efforts, and senior citizen service and nutrition projects.

A voluntary association of 151 local governments (13 counties, 110 cities, 18 school districts and 10 soil and water conservation districts) H-GAC serves an area including 3.9 million people in the counties of Austin, Brazoria, Chambers, Colorado, Ft. Bend, Galveston, Harris, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Walker, Waller and Wharton.
