As Easter comes hopping around the corner, now is the time to think about how the exchanging of Easter eggs began. Exchanging decorated

eggs is an ancient family tradition. But how the tradition of decorating eggs on Easter originated is still unclear to this day. Legend has it that Simon of Cyrene, who helped carry Christ's cross to the Calvary, was an egg merchant by trade. When he returned from the crucifixion to his farm, he supposedly found his hen's eggs had miraculously turned a myriad of colors. Since miracles like that don't happen every day, people took to decorating eggs themselves, then exchanged them on Easter to honor Christ. That tradition has remained nearly unchanged to this day. What has changed quite a bit over the centuries is the way we decorate our eggs. Since our ancestors didn't have the luxury of manufactured egg painting kits, they had to find other means of decorating their eggs. For instance, to get a solid green coloring on the egg, they would boil the eggs with spinach leaves. Once they had done that, they would use juices from various fruits or vegetables or roots to add colorful designs and patterns to the eggs. Of course, today we can go to the store and get different paints to decorate eggs.

Foot Facts

WARTS NEW?
A wart is a virus infection that can occur anywhere on the surface of the skin. It often looks like a mushroom sprouting up from surrounding tissue, except when it's on the sole of the foot. Then, instead of growing out, it grows in — due to the sole of the foot pressing down on it. Warts occur both singly and in clusters, and can be remarkably stubborn to remove. Podiatrists have tried everything from freezing them off with liquid nitrogen to burning them off with an electric cauterizing device or a laser beam. A new prescription medication offers hope for a less painful solution to many warts, including plantar warts. It is a little dot of gum, with salicylic acid mixed in. The dot is applied at bedtime and covered with adhesive tape. It's removed the following morning, after the skin has absorbed the medication.

As the skin is really the medium between our internal and the external world, it is really expected that eruptions such as warts are so common. P.S. It may take several weeks of repeated use for a wart to vanish using the above-mentioned transdermal patches.

Baylor baseball staff again holding baseball camp

Baylor University Head Baseball Coach, Mickey Sullivan, will again head up the operation of the Mickey Sullivan Little League Baseball Camp.

Coach Sullivan's goal is to develop the state's top Little League Baseball camp. In order to achieve this goal, Coach Sullivan will utilize the baseball coaching staff of Baylor University. Additional instructors for the camp will come from other colleges, junior colleges, and Texas high schools.

Bill Bracher, Assistant Baseball Coach of Baylor University, will serve as the Camp Director. The responsibility of the day-to-day operation of the camp will fall upon his shoulders.

Sid Hudson, Pitching Coach of Baylor University, will direct the instruction of the pitchers at the camp.

Players that play positions other than pitcher will also undergo training that applies to their particular position. Individual defensive skills will be stressed as well as team defenses.

Each player will be taught basic offensive skills. Included in these are: batting, drag bunting, proper swing and base-running.

Each day will be divided into three sessions. The morning and afternoon

sessions will be used to teach individual offensive and defensive skills. The night session will include a game under the lights.

During the week, the baseball staff will take the time to discuss important topics with the young players. Two of the topics to be discussed are drug abuse and the importance of school.

For the eighteenth summer, Little League Baseball will offer three baseball camps for boys nine through fifteen years of age. The three one-week camps will be held July 7-12; July 14-19; and July 21-26.
