Early Baseball in Eagle Lake of 1905

In 1905 the reporting of local baseball was kept to a bare minimum. The only team in 1905 was the late-formed 1904 team called the Skippers. An assumption of why the reporting was not as good as other years is that the teams did not do as well and the popularity of the game subsided.

The most interesting game that Eagle Lake played was perhaps the one on June 8, 1905. This contest was played between the Skippers and the Sioux Indians, a team claiming to be from South Dakota. There were two games played that day. The real game was played during the day and was lost by the Skippers with a score of 7-3. The next game, played at night, was in reality no game at all; it was only a money-making scheme. In fact, the ball being used was not even a baseball. It was a large, hollow, rubber ball. The diamond was lighted by gas lanterns and the outfield played up in the diamond. The Indians won this game after seven innings with the score being 7-3. Everyone had a good time at this game.

Another amazing event happened to the Eagle Lake team as they played the third game of a three-game series in La Grange. After splitting the first two games, the third was won by La Grange 3-0 because the Eagle Lake team struck out 26 times. This is a pretty amazing feat when you consider there are only 27 outs in a nine inning game.

Other tidbits in 1905 informed the researchers that local players from the earlier teams were now playing for bigger towns. The fan-favorite of the 1903 Canebels, Lester Smith, moved on to play with the Beaumont team. Smith was a leading hitter for Beaumont with a .333 batting average, which ranked him fourth in the league.

The Skippers ended the season with nine wins and 15 losses. As one can see, interest can be lost in a team with a poor record. This is one reason that it is believed to be true as to why the newspapers gave such little coverage to the team that year.

Drug Survey Results

In the spring of 1990, the Texas Commission of Alcohol and Drug Abuse, in conjunction with the Public Policy Resources Laboratory at Texas A&M University, administered a survey to students in grades six through twelve in the Rice Consolidated Independent School District. A total of 587 students completed the questionnaire, which asked about students' experiences with alcohol and drugs. Of that number, 21 surveys were excluded from analysis because the students did not report their grade level of age, or because they were identified as exaggerators (i.e., they claimed to have used a non-existent drug or they reported overly excessive drug use). The final numbers of surveys included in the overall district analysis was 566.
