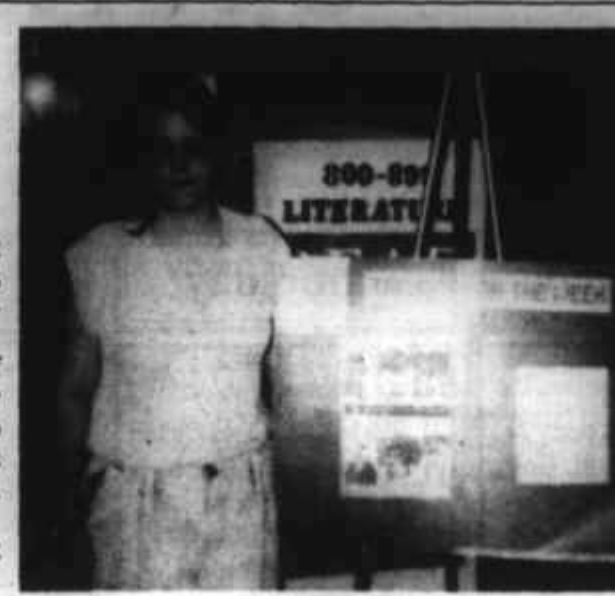
RAD thought for the week

The final outcome for April 19, 1991 game was Rice 11 - Columbus 4. Rice scored three runs in the first inning and capitalized on numerous Cardinal errors to defeat Columbus 11-4 in District 20AAA action. Rice (7-8, 1-1) was led by Kevin Jackson's 2-4, 2 RBI hitting and Wade Satsky's four inning scoreless relief effort on the mound in handling Columbus's second district loss.

Rice opened the scoring in the top of the first when Raymond Ford and Ernest Sims scored on RBI singles by Norman Botard and Wade Satsky. Botard rounded out the scoring by crossing the plate on a wild pitch.

In the second, Ford singled with one out and scored on a Columbus error. Ernest Sims scored on Kevin Jackson's RBI single after reaching base by an error.

Kerry Sims led off the fourth with a single, stole second and third, and scored on Botard's sacrifice fly. Ernest Sims scored the third run in the game on another Cardinal error.

The Raiders scored two more runs in their half of the fifth when Ernest Sims singled to bring home Kerry Sims. Ford scored the final run of the inning when Cardinal shortstop Jason Geisler booted Botard's grounder.

Rice completed their scoring in the sixth when Shane Laake walked to force in Satsky from third and Aaron Machac scored on another Cardinal error.

Leading hitters for Rice were Kevin Jackson with two hits and two RBIs and Ford, Ernest Sims, Botard, Satsky and Kerry Sims with one hit each. Rice stole ten bases in the game.

Sealy 6, Rice 3

Survey Results

In the Spring of 1990, the Texas Commission of Alcohol and Drug Abuse, in conjunction with the Public Policy Resources Laboratory at Texas A&M University, administered a survey to students in grades six through twelve in the Rice Consolidated Independent School District. A total of 587 students completed the questionnaire, which asked students' experiences

with alcohol and drugs. Of that number, 21 surveys were excluded from analysis because the students did not report their grade level or age, or because they were identified as exaggerators (i.e., they claimed to have used a non-existent drug or they reported overly excessive drug use.)

The final numbers of surveys included in the overall district analysis was 566.

FIGURE 3. PREVALENCE OF LIFETIME ALCOHOL USE (GRADES 6-8 & 9-12)

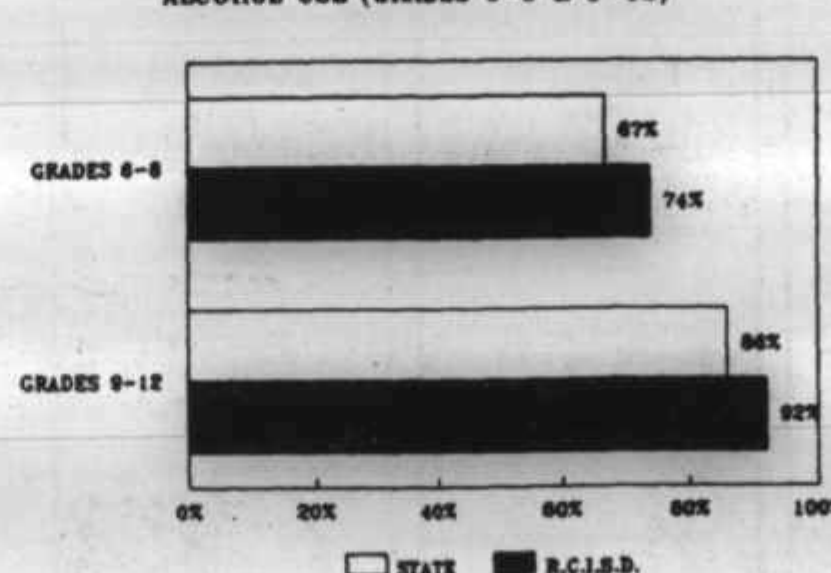
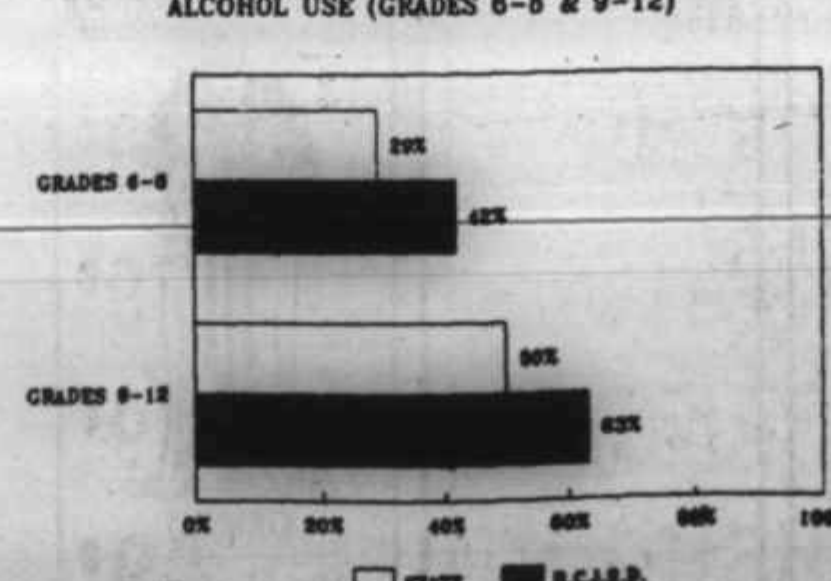


FIGURE 4. PREVALENCE OF PAST 30 DAY ALCOHOL USE (GRADES 6-8 & 9-12)

Semi-pro baseball in Eagle Lake Circa 1906

Up until the June 16, 1906 edition of the Eagle Lake Headlight, the newspaper reporters were uncertain of whether or not Eagle Lake actually had a baseball team. Part of the newspaper report read as follows, "The first intimation of the fact that Eagle Lake

has a baseball team this year came to our ears Monday morning. The team was still the Skippers, and they played a three game series with the Bellville team." The first game was won by Eagle Lake in which the local citizens were stunned by the victory. The next two games were not so surprising as the Skippers were defeated by three and twenty runs respectively.

On Thursday, August 16, Wallis came to town expecting to play a game against Eagle Lake. It turned out that the game was not played due to a disagreement about the starting time of the game. Wallis was under the impression that the game was to be at two o'clock; however, Eagle Lake refused to play in the heat of the day.

To show their "good sportsmanship", Eagle Lake went to Wallis to play their team the next day. Eagle Lake won this game with the score being 3 to 1. The complete regular line-up was as follows: Howard Duke, catcher; Warren "Boots" Walker, pitcher; Frank Davidson, first baseman; Jack Davidson, second baseman; Light Roberts, third baseman; Terry Balhorn, shortstop; and Morgan Flowers, Wilbur Forrest and Bob Walker took up the outfield.

Even though this was a very short season, Eagle Lake showed improvement from the previous years. Their record was four wins and two losses. The wins came over Bellville, Rock Island, Hallettsville and Wallis.
