Kindergarten, Pre-K registration April 30

Tuesday, April 30, from 9-10 a.m., registration for kindergarten and pre-kindergarten students will be held at the Garwood School Office for the 1991-92 school year.

To be eligible for kindergarten a

child must be five years old on or before September 1, 1991. A birth certificate, social security number and health records are needed to register. It will not be necessary for a pupil currently enrolled in pre-kindergarten to register for kindergarten next year (1991-92).

To be eligible for pre-kindergarten a child must be four years old on or before September 1, 1991. A child must be unable to speak and comprehend the English language or be from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, are at or below subsistence level.

Your child will be required to have had at least three (3) DPT/Polio shots, the last of which was given after their fourth birthday. They should have one MMR.

Parks, Wildlife Department releases turkeys

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department recently completed its turkey stocking effort for 1991 in the local counties.

Approximately 35 turkeys were released on each of four sites. The release areas were in Lee County near Lincoln, Fayette County in the Warda area, and two sites in Colorado County along the Colorado River. One of the Colorado County sites is south of Columbus and the other is north of Columbus.

The turkeys being stocked are wild trapped Rio Grande birds. They were trapped in Schleicher County.

The Department's turkey stocking policy is to release approximately 40 birds each year for a three year period. Ideally, 32 hens and 8 gobblers are released yearly on each area.

The releases in Fayette and Lee Counties were the third and final release. It was the second release on both Colorado County sites.

In addition to the turkey release area near Lincoln, turkeys are becoming established in the northern part of Lee County as a result of a past stocking.

On the Milam-Lee County line. In Colorado County, two additional stockings were completed in January, 1991. One of these areas was on Cummins Creek and the other on Skull Creek.

Last year two other sites were completed in Fayette County. One area was on the Fayette and Gonzales County line in the Clifton area. The other area was located on Buckner Creek between Muldoon and La Grange.

Three additional release sites in Fayette County have been signed up and approved to receive birds. However, these areas will not receive any birds this year.

Turkey reproduction has been very poor the last three years in the areas where birds are usually trapped. Consequently, turkey populations are down and no surplus of birds is available for trapping. When birds become available, these new release sites will be stocked.

Over the past few years the Parks and Wildlife Department has released approximately 1000 turkeys in the

Rice rolls over Brookshire Royal 10-0

Wade Satsky fired a one-hitter and Raymond Ford and Kevin Jackson had three hits each as Rice (8-8-1, 2-1) rolled over Brookshire Royal in a District 20AAA contest.

Satsky improved his mound record to 3-1 on the year and 2-0 in District competition by facing only one batter over the minimum.

Brookshire's Darrell Sims led off the

Ernest Sims scored one of two third inning runs coming home on Botard's single to right. Sims had walked and stolen second and third base to begin the inning. Kevin Jackson scored the other run of the inning, coming home on a Satsky ground ball.

Rice added a single run in the fourth when Ford singled to score Kerry Sims from second base. In the fifth, Jackson doubled to open the inning. After Will Atkins walked and advanced to second base, Laake drove home both with a single to center for his second and third RBI's of the game.

Rice completed its scoring in the sixth. Ford scored on Botard's second single of the game. Ford led off the inning with a single. Jackson singled and both scored on Satsky's single to left.

Leading hitters for Rice were Ford and Jackson with three hits each; Botard and Laake with two each, and Satsky with one. Laake and Satsky drove in three runs each and Ford and Botard drove in two apiece.
