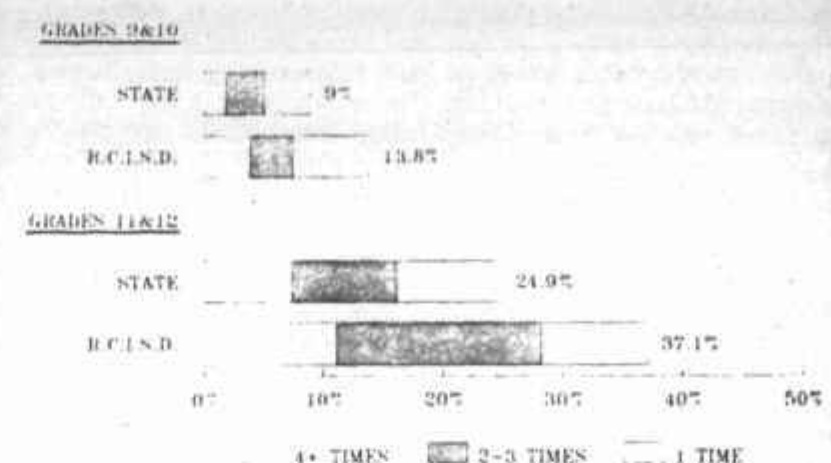

Texas School Survey of Drug and Alcohol Use

In the Spring of 1990, the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, in conjunction with the Public Policy Resources Laboratory at Texas A&M University, administered a survey to students in grades six through twelve in the Rice Consolidated Independent School District.

A total of 587 students completed the questionnaire, which asked about students' experiences with alcohol and drugs. Of that number, 21 surveys were excluded from analysis because the students did not report their grade level or age, or because they were identified as exaggerators (i.e., they claimed to have used a non-existent drug or they reported overly excessive drug use).

The final numbers of surveys included in the overall district analysis was 566.

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Best Times to Take Medicines

Many drug products seem to work best and/or cause fewer problems when taken at specific times of the day, with food, or without food. Because each medicine is unique, ask your pharmacist about the best time of day or night to take your medicines.

Diuretics ("water pills") can disrupt sleep and produce inconvenient trips to the bathroom if they are taken too close to bedtime. When prescribed for once-a-day dosing, mornings or afternoons are considered the best times to take these medicines.

Many antibiotics (infection fighters) often are prescribed to be taken before meals when the stomach is empty. One of the primary reasons for taking antibiotics without food is to produce higher antibiotic blood levels.

Arthritis medicines occasionally are upsetting to the stomach and may be prescribed to be taken "with meals" or when the stomach is full. Food provides a cushion on which these medicines fall.

Certain heart medicines are prescribed to be given at 8, 12, or 24 hour intervals. These precise dosing times should be followed in order to help ensure that the medicine is present in the bloodstream at the desired concentration at all times of the day.
