I stopped by Prairie Edge this morning and the atmosphere was far removed from the "Grand Central Station" setting. Vic Scott was there along with two out-of-town couples who were interested in buying some wildflower seeds and then to go see flowers in and near Eagle Lake. They probably could see the big field of phlox from the Calloway Road. I hope you are enjoying the beautiful wildflowers blooming in Eagle Lake at these locations: the old S.A. & A.P. right-of-way, the patch of larkspurs to the right of the Eagle Lake Recreation Center entrance, the many varieties growing at telephone pole sites on 90A East. There probably will be more folks than ever to plant seeds this fall in hopes of a wonderful crop this next spring.

Prairie Edge was acclaimed by many, many visitors as being a superior museum. Next year one shall want

to repeat the idea of having visitors pinpoint their hometowns, cities, counties and islands on maps. Eagle Lake is definitely a place on the map now for many travelers. I talked with Gilbert Owen this morning; he told me that his son Ted Owen who is a CPA and lives in Kingwood, had called to tell him that while sitting in his hotel room in Athens, Greece, he had seen on television a film featuring Eagle Lake, the John Thomas Farm, Prairie Edge Museum and the wildflowers. Special thanks go to Vic Scott who again was the coordinator.

On Arbor Day, April 27, Garwood citizens joined President Bush in planting a tree.

Years ago the state of Nebraska established Arbor Day to replace a renewable energy source, oxygen. Trees use carbon dioxide and give off oxygen, making our environment healthier.

Viola Faykus Zaboril donated three oak trees which were planted in memory of her father, Alfons George Faykus. In 1929, Alfons and Millie Faykus bought property and built the first cotton gin in the Garwood/Nada area. Their first home in Garwood was the old Ravon home on the corner of Nelle and Main Streets and is currently owned by the Raymond Wied's.

In 1952, the cotton gin and adjoining lots were bought by brothers Joe and Ed Seifert. Presently, the property belongs to Joe Seifert who operates a liquid fertilizer business.
