Another ingredient tossed into 'broiling broth of Texas controversy'

That boiling broth of Texas controversy called the insurance industry had yet another ingredient tossed in last week by yet another cook.

Last week a South Texas state district judge declared Texas workers' compensation law unconstitutional, thus unraveling what lawmakers forged after three sessions in 1989.

Insurance spokesmen promptly predicted that voluntary insurers will pull out of Texas if the Texas Supreme Court does not overturn the decision. This is bad timing for Gov. Ann Richards, whose campaign pledge to reform the insurance industry helped put her in office, but offers her an opportunity to redeem her promise.

But the decision by State District Judge Roy Perez clears the score-board, pending an appeal by Attorney General Dan Morales.

The Texas AFL-CIO, which filed the lawsuit in Eagle Pass where there is a large number of migrant farm workers, contends the new law limits workers from suing to collect damages for work-related injuries.

Meanwhile, House Speaker Gib Lewis said a new bill by State Rep. Robert Junell, D-San Angelo, will attempt a remedy.

Senate/House Action
"The Senate, on a voice vote, approved a bill by Sen. Ted Lyon, D-Rockwall, allowing Texas' major league sports franchises to drop workers' comp insurance on athletes also covered by contracts guaranteeing medical and rehab benefits."

"The Senate, by one vote, also stalled a bill by Sen. Gene Green, D-Houston, which would allow private citizens to carry concealed handguns for protection."

"The Senate passed a bill by Sen. Gonzalo Barrientos, D-Austin, to forbid discrimination in legal contracts, and a measure by Sen. John Whitmire, D-Houston, to allow motorists to erase traffic tickets once a year with defensive driving courses."

"House members passed a bill requiring doctors and dentists with AIDS to inform patients, and vice versa, before performing a procedure exposing either to the disease."

"Gov. Richards signed into law new regulations for credit unions, including a protection against having to reveal whether the lender is having financial difficulty."

"A bill sponsored by Rep. Frank Collazo, D-Port Arthur, to authorize casino gambling on Pleasure Island, just off Port Arthur, was defeated by a vote of 73-65. Three home county members voted against the measure."

Political Range War
In 1989, the issue turned the Legislature into a site for a political range war, which pitted pro-business interests against trial lawyers and labor unions, with business seemingly getting the victory.

Insurance Exodus?
Employers who buy the insurance for their employees sought the limitations, arguing that excessive damage awards gave Texas the nation's costliest rates.

Many view workers' compensation as a golden goose which is steadily being killed by too many trial lawyers and fortune seekers.

Spokesmen for employers urged them not to drop the coverage until the Supreme Court speaks.

"An eyebrow raiser: The Texas Workers' Compensation Commission, a state agency, has leased its Houston office in a building owned by the pension fund of an electrician's union affiliate of the Texas AFL-CIO."

Laughlin reports from Washington...
Legislation mandates special inspections of older aircrafts.

As a member of the Public Works and Transportation Committee and the Subcommittee on Aviation, I am pleased to express my support for

House Resolution 172, the Aging Aircraft Safety Act of 1991. This bill requires the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), to evaluate and inspect aircraft 15 years and older for airworthiness and safety.

In 1988, 28% of the "world jet transport fleet" was comprised of aircraft 20 years and older. The FAA projects that number will increase to 35 percent in 1995 and to 40 percent in the year 2000. These figures clearly demonstrate how increasingly important it is to have a sound maintenance program in place for older aircraft still in use.

Requiring special inspections and implementing mandatory reviews of older aircraft in-service is a necessary step towards securing the highest degree of aircraft safety for its passengers.

Health care bills unveiled
The Rural Health Care Coalition unveils its 15-bill legislative package today addressing various health care issues facing rural America.

Laughlin, an active member on the Coalition's Task Force on Physicians and the Task Force on Hospitals, believes the Rural Health Care Coalition (RHCC), has succeeded in responding to the particular problems in rural areas. "The Coalition has done a tremendous job addressing rural health care needs," said Laughlin. "The legislative initiatives introduced recently are positive moves toward providing the necessary resources for rural health care reform."

Laughlin targets two measures as top priorities: The Rural Physicians' Incentives Act, which focuses on recruitment of new physicians; and the Rural Medical Emergencies Air Transport Act, which allows states to apply for grants to create or enhance air medical transport systems.

"I believe these bills are essential to attract and retain qualified doctors in rural areas and to provide victims of medical emergencies with the access to necessary treatment centers," said

Cpl. Smith told of his four months and one day tour in Saudi Arabia. On the way to Kuwait City, his infantry

division went through two mine fields. Once they were in Kuwait City, they had to go from building to building to set up security on all highways going in and out of the city. He was there approximately three weeks. He also talked about the food, lack of showers and razors and the weather which ranged from 85 to 40 degrees during the war. He also mentioned the oil well fires and how the sky was

Other bills in the package include: legislation to provide for the establishment of Departments of Family Practice in medical schools; access to obstetrical care; encouraging telecommunications use by rural health care providers; and providing funds for the treatment of drug and alcohol abuse.

The Rural Health Care Coalition was organized in 1987 and is comprised of members from 47 states. It is a bi-partisan group of 165 lawmakers from around the country concerned

with access to quality health care in rural America.

Supports tax limitation pledge.
Four and a half months into the new year and according to recent reports, most Americans have still not earned enough income to meet their 1991 tax bill.

The Balanced Budget/Tax Limitation amendment will be introduced to address the problem. Taking a stand on the issue, Congressman Laughlin signed as an original co-sponsor of the legislation, which requires a balanced budget by limiting government spending rather than through increased taxation. "We must do something about balancing the federal budget without continuously taxing the American people," said Laughlin.

The amendment states the federal government should not grow at a rate faster than the national economy. It specifically forbids total government receipts to increase at a rate higher than the national income without the approval of three-fifths of the total membership of both Houses and Congress. In addition, the amendment also sets a permanent limit on federal debts to be changed only with a comparable three-fifths supermajority vote.

"I believe this amendment is a positive step towards securing a sound national economy," said Laughlin.
