Tami is the daughter of David and Patsy Fuller of Sheridan.



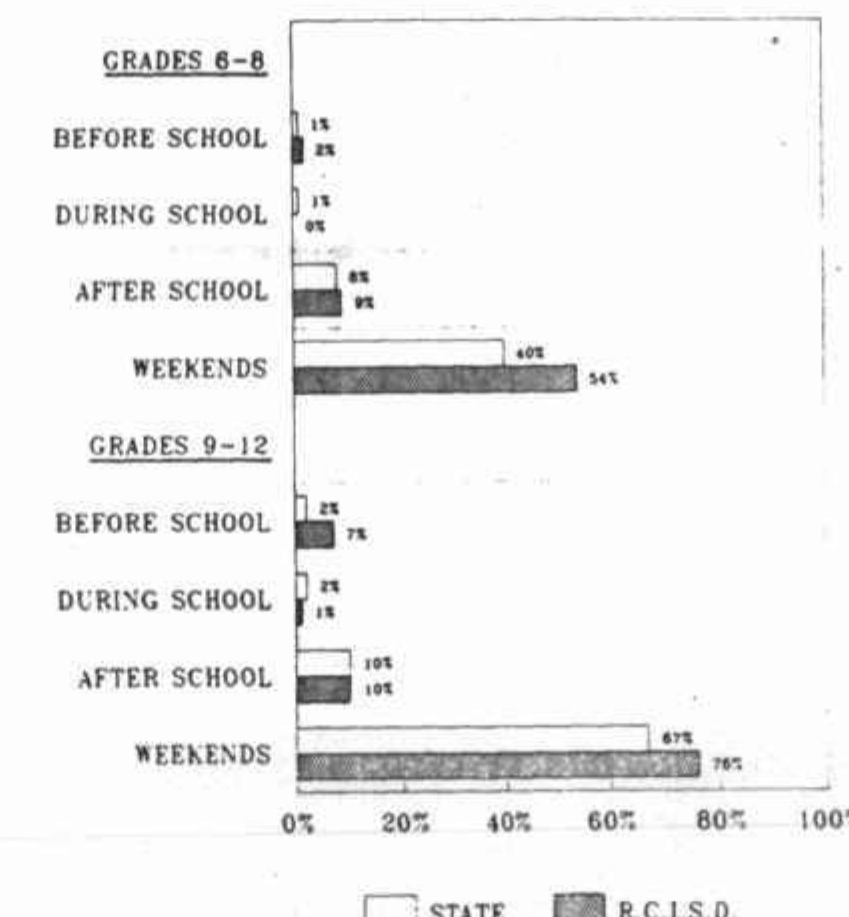
Texas School Survey of Drug, Alcohol Use

Secondary Survey Results

In the Spring of 1990, the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, in conjunction with the Public Policy Resources Laboratory at Texas A&M University, administered a survey to students in grades six through twelve in the Rice Consolidated Independent School District.

A total of 587 students completed the questionnaire, which asked about

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Heartburn: Inflammation of the Esophagus

Despite the name, heartburn is not a burning sensation of the heart. In fact, heartburn does not have anything to do with the heart. The medical name for heartburn is *reflux esophagitis*. The pain of heartburn occurs at a spot just behind the lower part of the breastbone. This pain is caused by the movement of gastrointestinal tract contents (digestive juices and partially digested food) into the esophagus. Irritation of tissues of the esophagus occurs.

Some individuals who have heartburn experience a burning sensation 10 to 15 minutes after eating a normal meal. The pain also may occur with overeating, smoking, drinking alcohol, eating highly seasoned or spicy foods, or lying down after eating a large meal.

Heartburn may be relieved merely by standing or sitting up. Dietary changes that may be beneficial include avoiding irritants such as fruit juices and alcohol. Nonprescription antacid medicines neutralize stomach acid and may lower pressure on the lower esophagus. Liquid antacids are commonly used for heartburn and often are recommended to be taken after meals and at bedtime.
