Oakland Heritage Days this weekend

Oakland Heritage Days will be held June 1-2, "On the Square", located on FM 532 between Weimar and Hallettsville. The firehouse portion of the pavilion is enclosed, a water well is completed and our members are preparing for our fourth annual festival.

This year the Heritage Days weekend will be dedicated to the troops of Desert Storm. All county service men and women will be honored during the opening ceremony at 10 a.m. Saturday, June 1. The fireworks show on Saturday just after dark will have a patriotic theme as will "The Another Chance Parade" on Sunday, June 2 at 11:30 a.m.

A new event, The Horned Toad Trot, the 5K run is scheduled for 8 a.m. Saturday beginning at the church office in Oakland. Prizes will be plaques to winners. Come for a run in the country.

The second annual Oakland State Bank Quilt Show will open its doors Saturday morning at 10 in the yellow house. The arts and crafts, commercial, food, drinks, the Wagner Carnival, the petting zoo and other entertainment booths open at 10 a.m.

Continuous entertainment will begin at the pavilion at 1 p.m. until 12:30 a.m. Music and ethnic dances will be featured. The Texas Dance Time Band, a country western group, will play for the free dance from 7:30 p.m. until 12:30 a.m.

The "5K's the Limit", a sky-diving group from Beeville, returns to jump at 4:30 p.m. Saturday by popular demand. The colorful precision parachutes are a highlight among the many activities.

The BBQ Cook-off takes place on Saturday with judging at 5 p.m. The Horseshoe pitching contest begins at 1 p.m. on Saturday.

Harvey T and KIKK will provide sound and music throughout the weekend. KVLG, La Grange, KRJH, Hallettsville and KULM, Columbus will do live broadcasts from the festival site.

New for the festival will be the museum located in the white building next to the pavilion. It will house articles and mementoes of Oakland's past.

Special events scheduled for Sunday will include a volleyball tournament. Registration is at 8 a.m. with play beginning at 9.

The "Another Chance Parade" begins promptly at 11:30 a.m. Sunday. It stresses the unusual in floats, costumes and entries. Categories are

unusual, civic, commercial, youth organizations, antique vehicles, humorous, best musical and equestrian. This year will stress the patriotic theme.

A chicken BBQ dinner will be available immediately after the parade for \$4 per plate.
