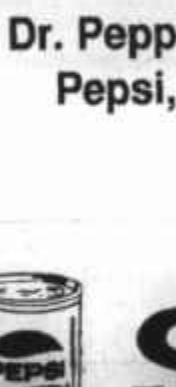

Foot Facts

TOENAIL SURGERY

Until you've experienced an ingrown toenail, you can have no idea of how painful it can be. Surgery is the only solution for a chronically ingrown nail, or for one that has been ingrown for a long time, is infected and has embedded itself in the soft tissue on either side. The podiatrist can remove the corner of the nail and some of the soft tissue to treat the infection. The treatment is a bit different for patients with diabetes or circulatory problems. Because patients with these medical problems have lower than normal resistance to infection and because impaired circulation means that surgical wounds heal very slowly, the podiatrist will try to avoid cutting into the tissue. Instead, the recommended treatment is to remove the nail itself, being very careful not to cut into the tissue or the nail bed.

For those with difficult to fit and sensitive feet, athletic shoes may offer comfort and convenience. Please call my office for further information or for an appointment, at the Eagle Lake Community Hospital at 409-234-5571. I am there the first and third Tuesdays of the month. I can provide for your entire family's podiatric needs, with quality medical care, gained from years of experience and attention to my patient's particular needs.

P.S. A surgically removed toenail will grow back in about six months. Meanwhile, the damaged tissue will have recovered.
