PRAIRIE EDGE MUSEUM NEWS

I look forward to reporting next week about the video audio film segments that are to be shown this evening July 1 at the board meeting. Debbie Ugarte is the photographer in charge of the recording. This film includes a tour of our museum made May 27; and since it is about an hour long, only parts of it will be shown this evening.

Bill Harrison and I enjoyed a visit Tuesday June 25 with Dorothy Walters, chairman of the Lavaca County Historical Museum and the following board members: Bernice Kifer, Cindy Steffek and Velma Vavrusa. This museum is tentatively scheduled to open August 30 and will be for all Lavaca County, which includes Hal-

lettsville, Moulton, Shiner and Yokum. The museum is located at 701 East Second in Hallettsville. Bill and I were happy to share our museum experiences with these visitors. Sammy Tise was also present to learn more about the running of a museum.

Visitors to Prairie Edge can have the pleasure of viewing a number of donations from relatives of the late Mrs. Nannie Barrow. Among these donations are the following: a bedspread crocheted by Mrs. Nannie Barrow about 60 years ago, old family silver, a plaque used in advertising by Reading Hardware, an envelope from Sears Roebuck with a 3 cent stamp, a framed Orphan Annie Code Book, and a 1943-44 Texas game laws pamphlet.

I have talked by long distance to Jodie Dupree Goggan, and it was she who was largely responsible for our having these articles. Her mother Alice Barrow Dupree donated a beautiful rosewood armchair. The museum is pleased to have on display the Remington typewriter used by Jodi's father Jimmie Dupree when he worked for Southern Pacific here in Eagle Lake. This typewriter will be a valuable artifact in our railroad display which we hope to be able to present soon.

In one of our display cases showing miscellaneous items are two round metal Texas license plates issued for the years 1917 and 1918 to a Cadillac. These plates were purchased by the late Haynie Matthews for his wife and were donated to the museum through the courtesy of Mary E. McCannahan, niece of Haynie Matthews.

One of the smaller cases contains only mementoes of election promotions. Among these is a tie with the name "TAFT". Another has two "framed" pictures of President Taft and his bride with the slogan "Hearts That Beat As One". There is a very attractive red, white and blue bow tie. Dewey advertised his campaign with an elephant suspended from a bar. Wilson had the following phrases imprinted on a campaign item: "Peace with Honor", "Preparedness", and "Prosperity". We shall be happy to have more of these campaign mementoes.
