Sons of Hermann opening new youth camp

The formal opening and dedication of a new Hermann Sons youth summer camp at Comfort will be held at 2 p.m. Sunday, July 14, Leroy Muehlstein of San Antonio, grand president of the Order of the Sons of Hermann in Texas, has announced.

That same afternoon, an open house will be held from 1 to 4 p.m. at the Order's Home for the Aged celebrating the 75th anniversary of the completion of the retirement facility for elderly members.

Both the camp and home are located on the Order's 303-acre tract bordering the Guadalupe River about a mile southwest of Comfort in the southeast corner of Kerr County. Grand Lodge officers, top officers of Hermann Sons lodges across the state, members and guests from lodges in the area are expected to attend both events.

A major fraternal benefit of the Sons of Hermann, the new camp, named Hilltop, was built at a cost of \$3,250,000 to increase the Hermann Sons camping facilities and complement the original summer camp, now called Riverside, opened in 1954 on a plain northwest of the retirement home.

Both camps are for junior members of Hermann Sons who are age 9 through 13. The original summer camp, dedicated Aug. 15, 1954, can accommodate some 3,000 campers each 10-week season. The Hilltop Camp will provide for an additional 160 campers each week, giving the Order a capacity of up to 4,600 campers. The camps are not co-ed. Girls will be scheduled at one camp and boys at the other.

The junior members will be housed in five 32-bed dormitories. Other Hilltop Camp buildings include a dining hall and kitchen, arts and crafts building, infirmary, administrative offices, two staff cabins, and a camp director's residence.

Buildings are of concrete and masonry construction and are air conditioned and heated for year-round use.

Recreational facilities for the campers will include a large swimming pool, three tennis courts, two volleyball courts, an archery range, horseback riding facilities, a softball field and a soccer field.

At both facilities, the camping program includes such activities as horseback riding, swimming, archery, tennis, volleyball, ceramics, leathercraft, macrame, rocketry, outdoor living skills, tumbling, twirling, golf, soccer, softball, canoeing and recreational games.

Camp director is Allan W. (Buddy) Preuss, a 1981 graduate of the Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos with a bachelor of science degree in recreation management.

The camps are overseen by the Grand Lodge Youth Activities Committee, composed of Grand President Muehlstein, Grand Secretary-Treasurer Lela Mae Fields and appointed members Karen Harborth of New Braunfels, Henry Hosok of Victoria, Wilburn Pargmann of Yoakum,

Stanley Schwerner of Schwertner and Lois Shade of San Antonio.

In its 37-year history the camping program has recorded some 60,000 camper weeks in attendance. In 1990 attendance totaled 3,099 at Riverside — a record. This season, some 3,600 campers are expected to attend Riverside and the Hilltop Camp.

Located on a hill overlooking the Guadalupe River Valley near Comfort, the Home for the Aged, also called Altheim, was built in 1915-16 for \$54,675.55. It is believed that this was the first time that any fraternal group had taken such action on behalf of its aged members.

The castle-like building was dedicated May 11, 1916, in a ceremony attended by representatives of lodges throughout Texas. Reports at the time indicate that some 8,000 members and guests were at the dedication at which Governor James E. Ferguson of Texas and Texas Hermann Sons Grand President August Haxthausen of Houston were the principal speakers.

Over the years the average number in residence has ranged from 50 to 75.

In January of 1964 ground was broken for a 22-room annex, and current capacity is 91 residents. Some 65 Hermann Sons members, including spouses, currently live at the Altheim.

Dizziness and Vertigo Affect Millions

Many individuals believe that dizziness and vertigo are the same problem, or that dizziness is a mild form of vertigo. Actually, these are similar but different conditions. Together, dizziness and vertigo affect about 20 million Americans.

Dizziness is a symptom of many health problems and often is described as a feeling of "lightheadedness," "a giddy feeling" or "loss of contact with one's surroundings." Children under 14 rarely complain of feeling dizzy. But dizziness is one of the major reasons for physician office visits by the elderly.

Vertigo is associated with motion perception. Individuals may complain of spinning around, falling, dropping, tilting, or swaying. Vertigo results from changes that affect the vestibular system, which has to do with body balance and equilibrium. Dizziness and vertigo should always be evaluated by a physician. A thorough diagnosis is essential since there are so many causes for these problems. Prescription and nonprescription medicines such as antihistamines, blood vessel dilators, and scopolamine may provide relief.
