

Pilot Club reps to attend International Convention

Barbara Pidgeon and Lucille Perry, official delegates of the Pilot Club of Eagle Lake, will attend the international organization's 70th Anniversary Convention at the Marriott Marquis Hotel, Atlanta, Georgia. The convention will be held July 27-31.

The event will draw more than 2,500 Pilot members from six countries. President Sue Trautwein of Owensboro, Kentucky will preside and Janette Bowers of Alpine, Texas will be installed as 1991-92 international president at the close of the convention.

Pilot International will undergo organizational renewal in the 1990's, and this and other important issues will be discussed at the convention.

Also, speakers will include health professionals knowledgeable about various categories of Brain Disorders, and Pilot Clubs undertake projects to improve the lives of those affected. The local Eagle Lake Club participated in Special Olympics each year. One highlight of the 70th Anniversary Convention will be the presentation of the 1991 Disabled Professional Woman of the Year, Catherine F. Bonke, M.D., of Pearland, Texas and DPWY First Runner-up, Adele D. Mitchell of Roanoke, Virginia. The DPWY Awards are sponsored annually by Pilot Club International, the President's Committee on Employment of People with Disabilities and the Pilot International Foundation. This year marks the 22nd anniversary of the program.

Also, at the convention, Beth Sharp of Atlanta, a rep. of Lifeline Systems, Inc., will present an \$8,000 Lifeline grant to the Pilot International Foundation. Edward R. Morgan of Northbrook, Illinois, executive vice president of Corporate Relations for the Allstate Insurance Company, will present a \$25,000 safety and health grant to the organization. The Eagle Lake Pilot Club sponsors the Lifeline project for Eagle Lake and the surrounding communities.

Pilot club International is a global organization of executive, business and professional leaders working together to improve the quality of life in local communities and throughout the world.

Discover St. Anthony School

St. Anthony School is committed to the realization of the three-fold purpose of Christian education — to teach doctrine, to build community, and to serve. The school environment and program allow the individual student to grow as a total person. Students are encouraged to seek and to share knowledge, to provide service within the school, parish and community, and to bear witness to Christ in their own lives. Family involvement and interaction is encouraged.

St. Anthony School offers quality education for children four years old through the eighth grade. All teachers are degree through accredited universities. The school itself is accredited by the Texas Catholic Conference Education Department and the Texas Education Agency.

Extra-curricular activities include the school choir which participates monthly in the parish liturgy and performs at various religious and civic functions throughout the year. Students in grades 5-8 may also receive instruction as part of the Columbus

Elementary School Band. Athletic activities include basketball, cheerleading, football (for 8th grade boys), softball, track and volleyball. Students in grades 3-5 are actively involved in the "Just Say No" club which educates the students on the dangers of the misuse of legal drugs and the use of illegal drugs.

Tuition rates begin at \$650 per year for one child. Rates are provided on a sliding scale for families with more than one child to help make a Catholic education possible for all. Tuition is paid monthly for a ten month period, August-May. The one-time registration fee is \$40. Bus fare costs are \$175 annually for families with one child, \$225 annually for families with two or more children. Lunch fees are \$1 per meal for those choosing to eat in the cafeteria.

Fees for pre-kindergarten students who have reached the age of four years by September 1, 1991 will be an annual registration fee of \$40 and monthly tuition of \$55 per child, for a ten month period (August-May).

Registration for the 1991-92 school year will be held at St. Anthony School from July 23rd-25th from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. Anyone not able to come these times is asked to call the school office for an appointment, 732-5505. New students must present a certificate of birth and Baptism, a complete record of immunizations and a Social Security card. Parents wishing to enroll their children in St. Anthony School for the first time must apply for admission by speaking to the principal, Ms. Judy Roeder.

4-H youth participate in district, state horse shows

Objectives of the Texas 4-H Horse Program include providing means for 4-H members to:

• Acquire horsemanship and horse training skills.

• Gain knowledge concerning science-related subjects on horse production, management, training, evaluation, use.

• Prepare for citizenship responsibilities and community service.

• Develop leadership, initiative, self-reliance, sportsmanship and other desirable life traits.

The Texas 4-H Horse Program accomplishes these objectives by offering projects and activities in horse management, production, training and use.

The four horse projects are: Horsemanship — includes managing, riding and training older horses with emphasis on learning skills necessary to cause a horse to perform in a desirable fashion;

Training — includes managing and training two or three-year-old horses. The project may also be an older horse that need further training or advancing a horse to another event; Weaning or Yearling Development — includes the management, conditioning and training of a horse until the horse is old enough to be ridden;

Mare/Foal — includes managing a mare through the complete production cycle from selecting the sire through weaning the foal.

Education programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

Commission, Feds allow six white-winged doves

Most Texas dove hunters will be allowed to take six white-wings per day during the mourning dove season, and hunters in the Central Zone will have an extra week during the fall season.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission set the early season mi-

gratory game bird season dates during a public hearing July 9 here.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service allowed the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to increase the white-wing daily bag limit from two to six in all but four Texas counties — Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr and Willacy. In those counties, where the white-wing population still recovering from a prolonged drought and the 1989 freeze that destroyed much of the citrus white-wing nesting habitat, only two white-wings will be permitted per day during the regular season, the same as last year.

Commission sets fee for conservation passport

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission approved a new \$25 Conservation Passport that will provide an opportunity for citizens to make a natural investment in Texas. It will open up vast areas of Texas to

outdoor enthusiasts and will provide discounts on many park services.

"This is an opportunity for Texans who don't hunt or fish to help support the conservation programs of Texas Parks and Wildlife," said Andrew

Sansom, TPWD executive director. "Hunters and fishermen make their contribution through license sales but there really hasn't been an effective vehicle for nonconsumptive users to contribute. The Conservation Pass-

port will give those who appreciate the natural beauty of Texas the chance to help preserve it."

The commission approved the fee during its public hearing July 9 in Port Aransas. The Conservation Passport, House Bill 1207, was passed during the recent legislative session. The bill becomes effective and passports will be available beginning Sept. 1.

Dove hunters in the Central Zone asked the department for a

shorter winter season and longer fall season, said Ron George, TPWD dove program leader. In response, the commission approved taking the last seven days of the winter season and adding them to the fall season in the Central Zone. The Central Zone season this year will be Sept. 1-Oct. 30 and Jan. 3-12.

Despite a one-million-bird increase in the continental blue-winged teal population, the USFWS denied a request by the department for a September teal season.

This year's 3.8 million teal represent a significant increase over last year's 2.8 million teal but is only slightly higher than the 3.6 million teal that existed when the season first was suspended in 1988.

USFWS also denied TPWD permission to have a four-day special white-winged dove season, instead leaving a two-day season.

Dates for the mourning dove season are: North Zone, Sept. 1-Nov. 9; Central Zone, Sept. 1-Oct. 30 and Jan. 3-12; and South Zone, Sept. 20-Nov. 11 (end Nov. 9 in Special White-winged Dove Area) and Jan. 3-19. Daily bag limits in all three zones in 12 mourning, white-winged and white-tipped doves in the aggregate, including no more than six white-winged and two white-tipped doves per day.

The only exception is Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr and Willacy counties in the Valley, which will have a daily whitewing bag of two. Possession limit in all zones is twice the daily bag. Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

The Special White-winged Dove season is Sept. 7-8 and shooting hours are noon to sunset. Bag limit south and east of Del Rio will be 10 white-winged, mourning and white-tipped doves in the aggregate, including no more than five mourning doves and two white-tipped doves per day. Bag limit north and west of Del Rio is 10 white-winged, mourning and white-tipped doves in the aggregate, including no more than two white-tipped doves per day. Possession limit is twice the daily bag. One fully-feathered wing is required on all dressed doves at all times in the South Zone and the Special White-Winged Dove Area.

Dates for rail and gallinule hunting are Sept. 1-Nov. 9. Bag and possession limits for king and clapper rails are 15 daily in the aggregate and 30 in possession. Sora and Virginia rails, 25 and 25; and gallinules, 15 and 30. Shooting hours for rails and gallinules are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.
