Frank Davidson of Eagle Lake introduced Rollin Baker who gave the program "Captain William Donovan". Mr. Baker graduated from the University of Texas, Texas A&M and received his PhD from the University of Kansas. He served in active naval duty during World War II and retired with the rank of captain. He was a professor of zoology and director of Michigan State University Museum from 1955-1983. He has been the curator of the Prairie Edge Museum since 1984 and is the author of numerous books and articles concerning zoology and mammalogy.

Mr. Baker stated in his interesting program on Capt. Wm. Donovan that he was born in South Carolina. At the age of 15, Donovan joined the Confederate Army. He was made a captain, wounded in service and had his left arm amputated. He came to Colorado County in 1866 because of land purchased by his father. He was well known in the county due to the two guns he carried all the time.

Donovan became involved with Mr. Eldridge and a business partnership was formed. Their relationship was filled with jealousy and a serious rift developed in 1900. On August 11, 1902, both men were on the same train and they argued. Eldridge shot and killed Donovan. Mr. Baker said that Donovan died at the right time because he had already made a significant mark in history regarding his agricultural accomplishments in the county.

ON YOUR FEET

The life expectancy of the average American has increased dramatically in the last century.
