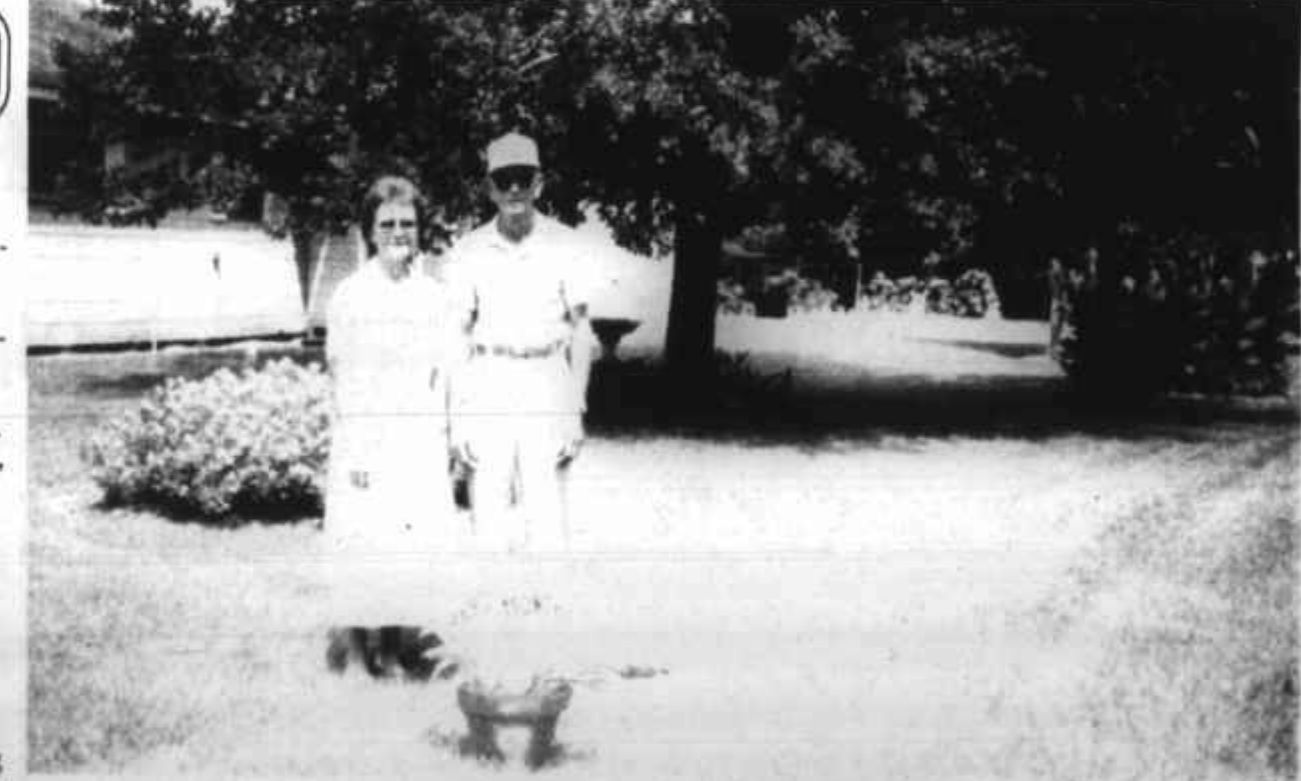
Colorado County hay show sample collection next week

Producers who are unable to bring a sample to a collection location may drop them off Wednesday and Thursday, Aug. 21 & 22 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day at these locations: Garwood Farmers Coop, M-G Farm Service Center, Sheridan Lumber Company, Heinsohn's Store, Bernardo Farm & Ranch Supply and the County Extension Office in Columbus.

Samples from round bales consist of 1/2 feed sack of unweathered hay. Write your name, address and type of hay on the outside of the sack. No fees will be charged for a laboratory protein analysis.

Shropshire-Upton Chapter No. 361, United Daughters of the Confederacy of Columbus, presented a service of the Bestowal of Crosses of Military Service last week at Nesbitt Memorial Library in Columbus.

President Betty Jo Rutta presided at the ceremony and the presentation of flags was performed by members of the Ladies Auxiliary No. 6113, Paul Perry-Hastold Chapter, Veterans of Foreign Wars of Columbus.

The Texas Division UDC Recorder of Crosses Betty Kaiser of Austin read the certificates telling of the honorees' service in particular wars and their Confederate ancestor's service.

Edith Williams, past president of Texas Division UDC and present chaplain, pinned the crosses on the recipients.

Rollin Baker of Eagle Lake served in World War II as a lieutenant in the United States Navy. His Confederate ancestor was William M. Perkins, Company I, 1st Mounted Rifles, Texas Infantry. His daughter, Elizabeth Baker Prescott of Houston, is a member of the local UDC chapter.

Virgil Womack of Alleton served in World War II as a private in the 43rd Depot Supply Squadron, United States Army Air Corps. His Confederate ancestor was Matthew Marion Womack, Company O, Phillips' Volunteers, Georgia Infantry, CSA. His daughter, Virgie Ann Neisner, is a member of the local UDC chapter.

Earnest Harrison Walker Sr. of Eagle Lake served in World War II as ship's cook First Class, United States Navy. His Confederate ancestor was Albert Harrison Carter, Company B, 5th Regiment, Hood's Texas Brigade, CSA. His wife, Mrs. E. Harrison Walker, is a member of the local UDC chapter.

Paul Lee Hattermann of Orange Park, Fla., served in the Vietnam Conflict as a Specialist 5 in the 1st Infantry Division, United States Army. His ancestor was Alfred Walker, Company I, Barnes' Regiment, Texas Infantry, CSA. His mother, Melba Jean Walker Hattermann is a member of the local UDC chapter.

George John Wornat, deceased, was honored for his service in World War II as a carpenter's mate, 3rd Class, United States Navy. His ancestor was John Sauer, 22nd Battalion, Texas State Troops, CSA. His award was presented posthumously and accepted by his niece, Marilyn Wornat of Columbus.

The service ended with the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner" and "God Bless America." Refreshments were served immediately afterwards.
