which there is a clinically significant reduction in red blood cell count, (hematocrit or hemoglobin). Iron deficiency anemia and anemia of chronic disease are the most common among the elderly.

Iron deficiency can be caused by numerous factors with blood loss being the most common. Some develop due to a nutritional deficit.

Many elderly persons' diets are low in iron content. Many are found to have been sustained on a diet high in cereal and milk, and low in animal protein. Iron which has been stored in the body is soon depleted and iron deficiency develops.

Chronic blood loss from peptic ulcer, esophageal varices and diverticulosis, nasal hernias and most common hemorrhoids, are major causes of iron deficiency anemia. Blood loss can also be induced by drug induced gastritis.

Symptoms usually occur as anemia progresses. Mild anemia will not cause any overt symptoms. Anemia can produce a state of confusion or worsen pre-existing dementia.

Many supplemental iron preparations are available, but the form of iron is very important as different chemical component forms are absorbed at much higher rates. As well all medication taking iron supplements have side effects and should be monitored by your physician.

Many residences admitted to Heritage House have suffered from anemia. Due to proper diagnosis by the physicians and orders followed by the trained professionals at Heritage House, most begin to improve promptly.

Medicare will now pay for routine mammography screening at C-FMC

As part of a new federal rule that was passed earlier this year, Medicare will now pay for screening mammography services rendered by a Medicare-approved provider. The rule, which was issued in January by the Health Care Financing Administration, requires all Medicare-approved providers of mammography services to meet strict safety, quality, educational and technical requirements developed by the American College of Radiology. The standards apply to the equipment being used, the technologist performing the exam and the physician interpreting the film. Providers desiring Medicare certification must forward a comprehensive application demonstrating they meet the Medicare standards.

On July 24, 1991, the Health Care Financing Administration notified Colorado-Fayette Medical Center that its mammography department has been certified as an approved provider for mammography screening services. As a result of this certification, Medicare will now pay for screening mammograms performed at Colorado-Fayette Medical Center. Medicare previously only covered the procedure when it was required by women with symptoms needing a diagnostic, or more detailed mammographic examination. The new rule will cover screening mammograms every two years for asymptomatic women 65 and over. While the majority of women covered by Medicare are 65 or over, the rule will also cover those of younger women who are on Medicare as the result of a disability.

For women considered at high risk, more frequent screening will be covered. These include women with a personal or family history of breast cancer and women who have not given birth by the age of 30.

The rule also requires that interpretation by a qualified physician be part of each covered mammographic screening examination. In addition, the physician must be certified by the American Board of Radiology, the American Osteopathic Board of Radiology, or by an appropriate program as determined by the Health and Human Services Secretary.

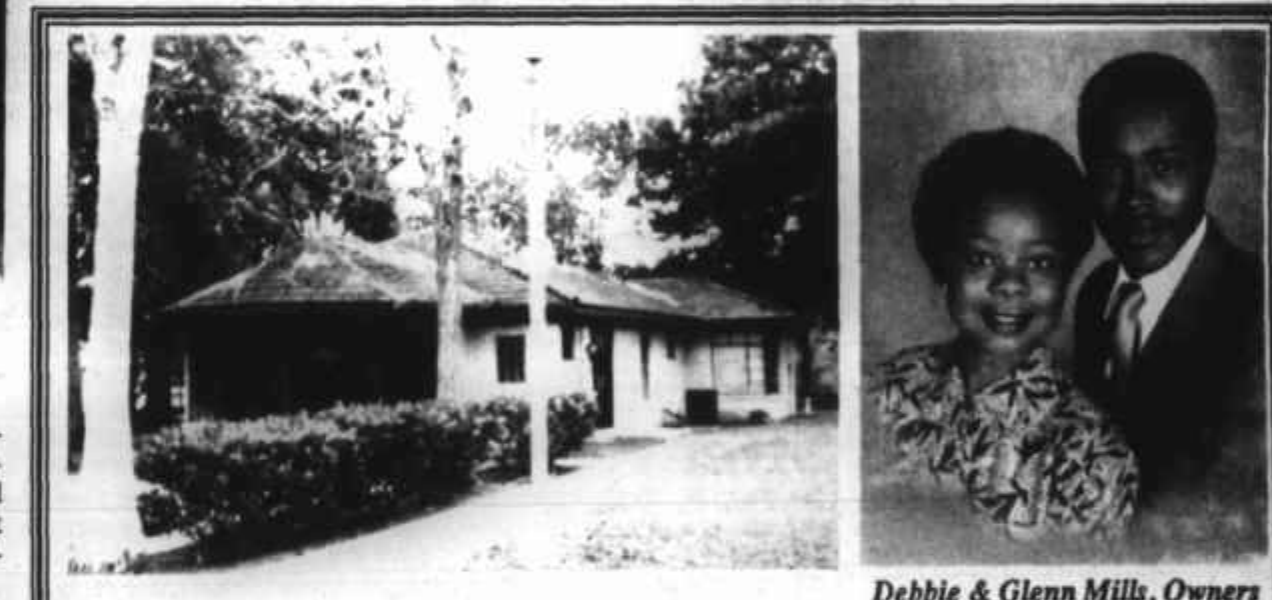
