EAGLE LAKE POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

Week of August 13-20, 1991

possibly in a white Cadillac. When Peters and Deputy Steve Scott arrived at the scene, the shooting victim, Lisa J. Williams, had been transported to Colorado-Fayette Medical Center in Weimar with a small contusion on her head where she had apparently been struck by the gun. It appeared the bullet that was fired had missed her entirely.

At the hospital, Peters and Scott took statements from four individuals, two eye witnesses, the victim and one witness. In the meantime, Coulter was obtaining a warrant for attempted murder from Justice of the Peace Precinct 2, Ed Hanzelka, Jr.

Fayette County was successful in apprehending Williams and also recovered a 22 caliber revolver (which had been reported stolen) from the white 1982 Oldsmobile 98 he had been driving. Picked up along with Williams was Brenda Williams who was released from custody after giving a statement to deputies.

Reginald Williams, who was on parole until June 1, 1992, from an assault conviction out of Houston, was transported to Colorado County Jail and booked for attempted murder and bond was set at \$20,000. There is also a "blue warrant" from Texas Department of Criminal Justice for breaking parole. This type of warrant means Williams can not be released from Colorado County Jail unless he is turned over to the state.
