We know that many trains pass through Eagle Lake every day. I sincerely hope that all of us will be very cautious as we approach railroad crossings. The two stop signs erected at the crossing on Commerce Street add to the safety precautions taken by our city and the S.P. Railroad.

Recently there was a special article printed in *The Houston Post* and was entitled "The Other Side of the Tragedy." The writer was David C. Battle, a railroad engineer. Following are excerpts from the article: "A collision between a motor vehicle and a train is the most senseless accident there is... it (the train) cannot suddenly stop or swerve in front of you... It was hard during Operation Lifesaver, a highway/railway effort put on by train crews and sponsored by the rail industry... to convince people that one road-type locomotive can weigh more than a 747 jetliner... Most everyone thought that a train could stop like an 18-wheeler. They did not know that the ratio between a car and a freight train was 4,000 or even 6,000 to one... Think about this when you approach a grade crossing... The simple 'crossback' found at every grade crossing means YIELD!... At 55 mph, the average train will take over one mile to stop after the emergency brakes are applied... People really do need to be educated concerning railroad crossing safety. LOOK! LISTEN! LIVE!"

\$44,200 Drug grant approved, not funded

For the last three years the Colorado County Valley Drug Council has had a grant for \$44,200 to provide counseling in seven schools in Fayette and Colorado counties. The grant was approved this year but not funded due to lack of money.

The Council is a part of Region 12 which includes Austin.

This is a disadvantage because there are many programs in Austin which are funded, leaving little money for Fayette, Colorado, Bastrop, Williamson and Hays-Caldwell counties.

Cathy Schneider, certified drug counselor, provided individual and group counseling for students who were performing poorly academically because of their substance abuse or substance abuse in their family.

This service was a benefit to the schools since there are no drug counselors in the schools in our area. Most of the schools cannot afford to contract for this service due to budget constraints.
