Garwood News

Hazardous waste site discussed (Mike Michalka attended the public meeting last week. This is his report of what occurred.)

Following their regular meeting last Wednesday night, the men of the Garwood Lions Club hosted a public gathering at Lehrer Interest's meeting room. The purpose of the gathering was to discuss the proposed hazardous waste site near Altair. Earlier this summer the Lions hosted Tricil representatives at a club meeting as well as a public meeting in the Garwood School cafeteria. At those meetings, Tricil representatives presented a program describing the operations they proposed and answered questions from the public. There were no Tricil representatives present at this latest meeting, however.

Park Christy conducted the meeting and explained the Lions' goal was to provide a forum where the public could become more educated about landfill sites and hear information from a source other than the company which proposes the site. He called on several people to address the crowd of about ninety citizens who listened intently to what was offered. Gene Linderman was the first to speak. Mr. Linderman is currently conducting a study in the Garwood area on the presence of certain chemicals in run-off water. He presented some very disturbing information to the crowd. He cited several reports of scientific research done by experts in the field. These reports concluded that flexible membranes permitted hazardous materials to penetrate and contaminate subsurface areas containing water.

Jack Johnson of the LCRA also spoke to the group. He reported that he had spoken with Tricil authorities very recently about the LCRA's concerns and the role they will play in monitoring the company's actions. He also recommended that citizens attend Texas Water Commission hearings which will begin after September 25, and express their displeasure with such a disposal site.

Robert Moss of Fairchild spoke passionately of his experiences with

companies that dispose of hazardous wastes. He said they are leaving urban areas because they have been opposed by the Environmental Protection Agency and strong citizen groups. They see rural areas like ours as "easy targets" because we are uneducated, unorganized and financially unable to battle the enormous amounts of money they can wield. He described their pattern of coming into an area, "spreading some impressive money around," convincing some area officials of their good intentions and trying to win their support.

Rick Abrams, an ardent environmentalist, also spoke. He is a leader of Texans United, a group which fights to protect our state's natural resources from pollution. He echoed the sentiment that huge companies target hopefully "easy" rural counties. He convincingly added that "permits don't protect people". He also gave encouragement, saying strong citizen organizations and public opinion can definitely sway the decision in their favor.

There were people from several other towns and communities who attended the meeting — Weimar, Columbus, Altair, Nada, Eagle Lake, El Campo (including the mayor and Chamber of Commerce members), Wharton and Boling. The delegation from El Campo strongly supported the meeting's purpose and expressed a desire to work with an organization planning to oppose the site. Another group from the Boling area, Concerned Citizens Against Pollution, related their experiences fighting a similar proposal in their area and gave some helpful advice on how to do the same here.

At the meeting's conclusion, a committee was appointed to nominate a slate of leaders who could direct an organization intended to oppose the hazardous waste disposal site. There was much interest expressed in gathering support in other areas of Colorado County as well as in Wharton County. A communication committee was also set up to advertise the organization's plans and seek support from other citizens who are concerned

about the possible dangers associated with such a waste disposal site.

Interested citizens may contact members of the nominating committee to learn more of their intentions. They are Herbert Engstrom of Garwood, Charlie Herter Jr. of Weimar, John Matthews of Eagle Lake, Patsy Weisuhm of Garwood, Bob Stallman of Columbus and Vic Hyek of Nada. A member from the El Campo area was also sought after.
